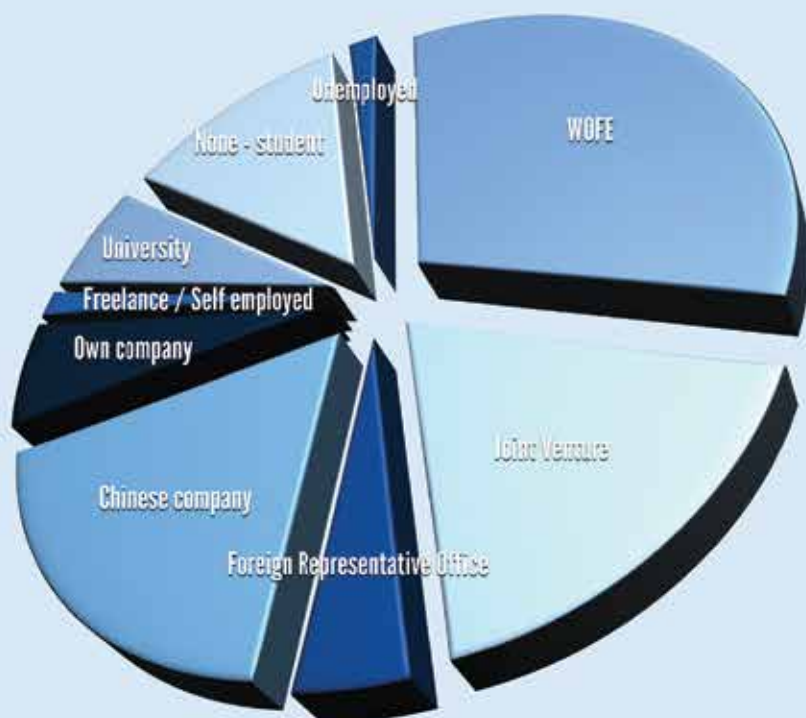

CENSURE: CARROT OR STICK

The carrot or the stick; which is the better approach when teaching in China? Chinese students tend to treat each of these with almost equal imperturbability, responding with only barely-perceptible enthusiasm regardless. Of the two, the stick is probably slightly more effective, but not to any significant degree. A possible reason is that concern for consequences (positive or negative) does not appear to play a large role in either the collective or individual Chinese consciousness.

Acceptance of what is, accompanied by an unwillingness to engage too deeply with political and social reality, seems to be the defining characteristic of many Chinese students. These elements are of course a fusion of Confucianism and Taoism, ancient philosophies still extant but predating the birth of Christ, China's equivalent of Western civilisation's founding philosophies as espoused by Plato, Aristotle, and perhaps Adam Smith or John Locke.

In other words, toss the carrot to a passing donkey and throw the stick in the garbage; they're both useless, more or less.

In my four years here, I have had the good fortune to experiment at all levels using a variety of methodologies; from kindergarten to post-graduate, from SAT prep to Asian history, from music to computer science; and the most successful strategy I have yet implemented has been that dreaded bane of inquiring minds everywhere; rote repetition and memorisation (argh!), with repetition being the more important of the two.

In my English writing classes (high school and university) for example, I have found that exercises which endlessly recycle (with minor but significant differences) the variety of ways in which sentences can and should be constructed has been far and away the most effective mechanism for persuading students to pay attention to the core building blocks; subject and verb.

A notably unproductive methodology which I have been forced to discard is the concept of using general principles to assist in specific cases. Example: Every sentence **MUST** have a subject and a verb. Result? A plethora of sentences lacking verbs. Oops. Back to the drawing board.


Another effort involved asking students to use carefully-selected, specific cases to derive the (obvious, to me) general principle. Result? A linguistic smorgasbord of sentences using the wrong verb tense (among other issues).

These efforts, successful and otherwise, reveal the underlying and often conflicting differences between Western and Eastern thought patterns, an issue which brought itself to my attention courtesy of the great gods of serendipity. Whilst traipsing blearily through a Xinhua bookstore in Handan one day, a small tome caught my eye. Criticism of the Chinese People's Thinking is a title which compels an obvious conclusion and leaves the reader little space for ambiguity.

Written by Beijing businessman Chu Yuzhu, the book was roundly condemned when it appeared in 2010, and certainly the poorly-translated English version aptly (and ironically) recapitulates the premise (and their corollaries) evinced by the title. Nonetheless, this particular cultural "ahem" served as an interesting reminder that foreigners cannot simply and unthinkingly import their societal norms into China with the expectation that they will instantaneously take root and flower. It just does not work that way, nor should it.

It is also worth remembering that Chinese students at the high school and university level are this country's intellectual élite. They are the best, intelligent if not curious, and like all intelligent beings, they do not respond well to arbitrary rules, randomised instructions, and meaningless directives. True, they need the benefits of repetitive learning (contemplate precisely how you first learned your own native tongue), but they also need a framework upon which to hang their learning, and they need a rapport with their foreign instructors, a personal connection that uses fundamental "human-ness" to bridge the cultural divide.

Since discovering this, I have made considerable efforts to surreptitiously circumvent the standards imposed by (in particular) western school boards and curricula, preferring to focus on what actually works, rather than on what should work.

I am happier; my students are happier; my employers are happier; and my fees have never been higher. 

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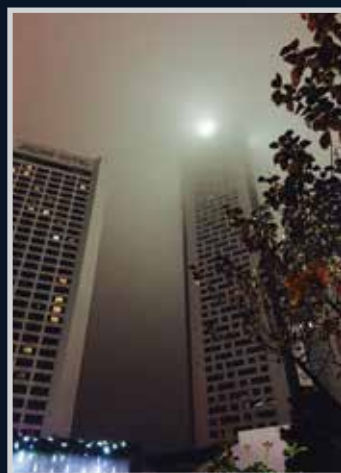
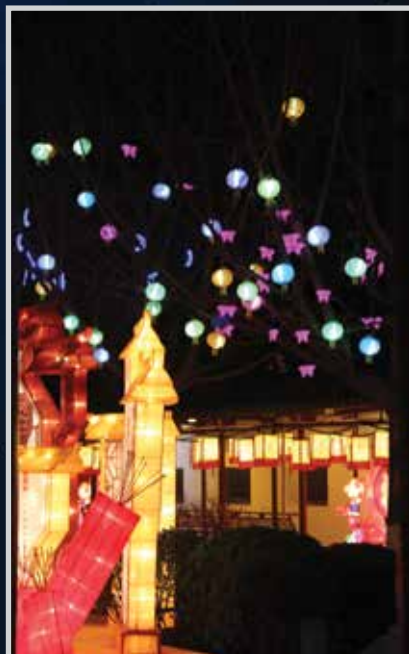

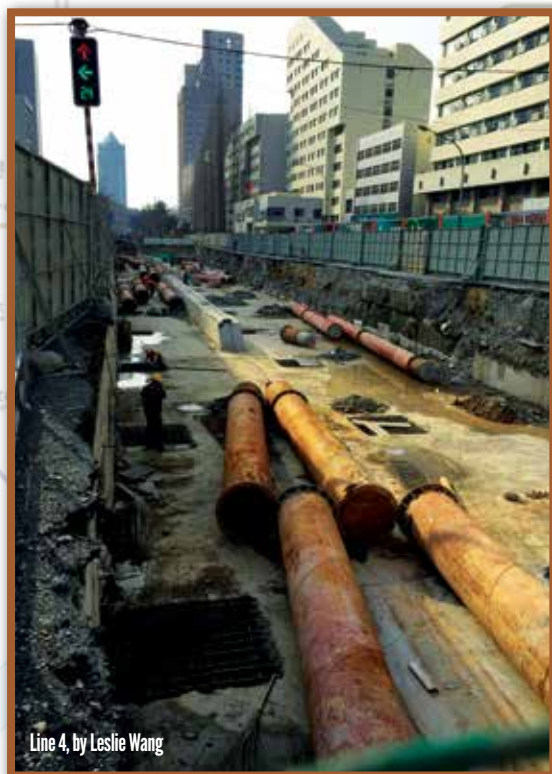

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Back to the Future China's Film Industry



One way to develop cultural understanding is by watching Chinese films. A look at the Time Out Guide of the 100 best mainland titles reveals a wide range from historical epic/martial arts fantasy/adventure/cartoon, to Hollywood glamour, and even gritty small town realism. What should you choose and how far is Chinese cinema influenced by western culture as opposed to internal change?

Chinese cinema started, as did the USA's, in the early 20th century. Not with Chaplinesque comedy, but with the rather more sedate and ear splitting Peking Opera. It entered its first so called "Golden Age" in the '30s with films such as "The Goddess", "The Big Road" and "Spring Silkworms". These featured ordinary people in situations involving class struggle and/or confronting the Japanese aggressors, in line with the Nationalist/Communist clashes of the time. This period ended with the much acclaimed (and remade in 2002) "Spring in a Small Town", featuring a copycat Humphrey Bogart character complete with gabardine and trilby hat, plus a romantic love triangle reminiscent of Hollywood's "Casablanca". As Yu Dong, the boss of Bona Film Groups, one of today's independent studios says, "Everything we learned, we learned from Hollywood."

Post Cultural Revolution, Chinese cinema found a new voice and exported it westwards. The wonderful "Yellow Earth" (1984) provides a nuanced view of the scars of the past with the two main characters; a government song collector on fieldwork and a young local girl; changing their political minds as the film progresses. Chinese cinema in the '90s then produced its first international star like a rabbit out of a hat; Gong Li in a range of award winning films popular in both China and in Western arthouse cinemas. These were "Farewell My Concubine", "Raise the Red Lantern", "Red Sorghum" and "The Story of Qiu Ju"; historical epics incorporating the big Chinese themes of honour and warmongering. In complete contrast, director Jia Zhangke got down in the gutter with his "Hometown Trilogy"; stories of small town China, disaffected youth and displaced lives going forward into a different world.

From slow cinema to the fast moving fantasy world of martial arts; Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon (2000) changed everything. It provided an introduction to Chinese language cinema and especially wuxia (the genre of Chinese fiction concerning the

adventures of martial artists in historic China) for many and increased the popularity of many earlier Chinese films. To date "Crouching Tiger" remains the most commercially successful foreign-language film in U.S. history. Director Ang Lee's multinational production and international "Best Picture" winner was not however as much of a blockbuster in China because it was not wuxia enough.

In 2012 China overtook Japan to become the second largest film market after the USA, with box office returns of over 17 billion yuan, and is heading to become the worlds biggest in 5 years' time. Films, whether watched online or on an IMAX screen have become central for young consumers and part of their courtship rituals.



As of November 2015, six of the top 10 highest-grossing films in China were domestic productions (Entgroup's China Boxoffice; CBO), marking a stratospheric increase in receipts. To gain a foothold in China, Hollywood studios are helping finance films or co-producing them. This year's "Gone with the Bullets", set in 1920s Shanghai, had a budget of around \$50million with a Broadway choreographer and American dancers. Backed by Sony, Hollywood's DreamWorks created an offshoot company, Oriental DreamWorks, to produce it in a joint venture with Shanghai Media Group. Xi Jinping attended the ceremony in Los Angeles. So is it Back to the Future for the Chinese Film Industry? **NUX**

Body Talk

More Energy Through Profound Truths

Before we get in to this, I better give you some back story. I met Serena and her husband Gene over a year ago, when they came to join the Xianlin Warriors' Rugby club. It quickly became apparent that this couple were far from new to the game. My sharp instincts were indeed right. Turns out we might call these two a rugby power couple. Serena is in fact a trainer for World Rugby and an ex-international player; as well as being a fully qualified teacher, yoga instructor and all round good egg. Needless to say the pinnacle of her career (no doubt) is coaching the Xianlin Warriors Women's team.

This back story is important because, quite honestly, if I didn't know Serena or her background I'd be tempted to put Body Talk in the same camp as most other alternative medicine practices, namely the "thanks, but not for me" camp. Yet, her credentials were too hard to ignore, and I became curious. I asked enough questions that eventually, she offered to give me a Body Talk session. 40 minutes on a massage table surrounded by nothing but silence (i.e. no childcare responsibilities), is impossible to say no to.

What is Body Talk?

Body Talk is essentially the body communicating about its state of health, giving the practitioner a way forward to address any imbalances or issues. The guiding principle is that the body knows how to heal itself, as evidenced by its ability to heal after a cut or bruise. There is some pretty scientific research that goes along with this. A NEW ERA FOR MANUFACTURING IN CHINA

China's transformation over the past 30 years has been mostly built on manual manufacturing. Today's manufacturing scene, however, is in need of its own transformation. With 26 years of experience in world class manufacturing operations, 8 of those years in China, I venture to expound on why and how.

The Need

Challenges facing China's manufacturing industry include rising labour costs, more sophisticated customers, and more complex value chains (in layman's terms, the process of converting raw materials to finished goods). Lower-labour cost countries attract investment and onshoring also increases when manufacturing returns to the host country.

Increased local demand is both a blessing and a curse for manufacturers in China. The new middle class drives a hard bargain. They want higher quality, but at the price they are used to paying. They have more disposable cash and increased choice on how to spend it. Consumers with more property, more food, more transport, more clothing and more children mean more competition for manufacturers.

Additionally, the rise of e-commerce has dramatically altered the modern Chinese consumer's habits. On 11th November (aka 11.11 or Singles Day), trading records have been broken each year, requiring delivery systems to cope with a massive spike, which they do brilliantly. But the impact on the manufacturer is huge, as thousands of small batches are ordered and stock is needed to meet the delivery promise.

The Solution


Historically, the approach to improving manufacturing in China has been to focus on hard skills, rather than search for the root causes and deal with reality. Although machinery needs to work harder and be more reliable,

productivity will only rise if soft skills are developed. I have seen the success of this approach first hand.

My most rewarding professional experience in China has been seeing team leaders, on the manufacturing floor, flourish because their managers gave them greater authority and the training to wield it. When floor leaders were given greater trust and responsibility, they grew in self-confidence, people listened to them, and they were recognized by their superiors. With this comes a more direct approach to problem solving and team management, and performance is accelerated. These empowered floor leaders often rise to management level, and even begin doing their own internal consulting.

Getting managers more involved in supporting the front-line teams, upgrading skills so operators can become technicians, and promoting leadership, transparency and inclusivity are all soft skills presenting a massive cultural change for the Middle Kingdom. The result will be increased competencies and decreased turnover. Smart manufacturing & Industry 4.0 is now being adopted, as a strategy for the future. For many, 3.0 is needed first!

Conclusion

My experience in China has taught me that those who can embrace a new norm of higher productivity will survive. It is not rocket science, but it does take a drastic culture shift, which of course does not happen overnight. If successfully implemented, both the companies and their members can be unleashed to thrive. In spite of the size of the challenge, I know it can be done because I've witnessed it, as early as 2007 and as recently as last week. It's my privilege to be part of the transformation, one company at a time.

Teasthetics

I am always amused by the ways book sellers hype their product. Statistical evidence (market share, sales figures, Facebook likes) may be enough to persuade you of the quality of a real estate agent or dog food. But for a cultural commodity, such as literature, this stuff sounds vulgar.

Book sellers describing an older book may instead list the languages into which it has been translated, boast of it being “never out of print” or acknowledge the (famous) subsequent writers it has influenced.

However, let us consider what they might say instead:

“It is an involving story. The characters are people with whom you can enjoy spending time. It will probably teach you stuff you do not know. You will turn the pages furiously, but the ending will still leave you sated.”

Such simple descriptions as this do not necessarily sound insincere (though sometimes they do). They do not have to carry “spoilers”. They also do not miss the point.

No. These things are the point; they are among the real criteria on which we choose a book for a long journey.

Yet before we hail this as a missed marketing opportunity, we need to acknowledge the real weaknesses. First is that such experiential information makes differentiation and memorisation of the individual item difficult. We may only want to fill our brain with the name of one “ideal” dog food. But one book, no matter how good it is, cannot satisfy a love of books.

The other problem is that these expressions of satisfaction are themselves “destinations”. For good reason, the creative discipline of literary criticism is not really concerned with “unpacking” these root sensations of the book-reading experience. They may be completely

true, but they do not offer much to think about or share.

A similar problem presents itself with tea. In trying to persuade another person (whether it is our customer or friend) that a tea tastes good, many of us will instinctively reach for the “tastes like lots of unusual (and expensive) things all at the same time” proof of quality, a relative of the multiple influence argument above.

While sceptical listeners may then ask, “If the greatness of this tea resides in its “subtle notes of pear and cinnamon”, why don’t you just play around with pear juice and Aftershock”, this comparison approach nonetheless still holds sway in Western discussion of commodities such as wine.

I mention it now because I do not think this approach has the same currency in a Chinese discourse on tea.

When I’m floundering, trying to describe the flavour of a tea in terms of, say, “sweetcorn”, I usually receive just a sympathetic smile. The “insight” of my comparison is not particularly appreciated for its accuracy, honesty or originality.

It is not just that Chinese terms for verbally appraising tea involve less demotic and food-based comparisons; there are in fact so many other intriguing details about which Chinese tea lovers would prefer to talk. The creative, playful associations surrounding a tea’s origins are indissoluble from any sensation it evokes, while the comprehensive vocabulary used for describing the sensations in the mouth and throat is specific to tea alone.

I could still say, *“This tea tastes really good. And it makes me feel really good”*. But there would be no point in saying; a good drinking companion already can already see. **NW**

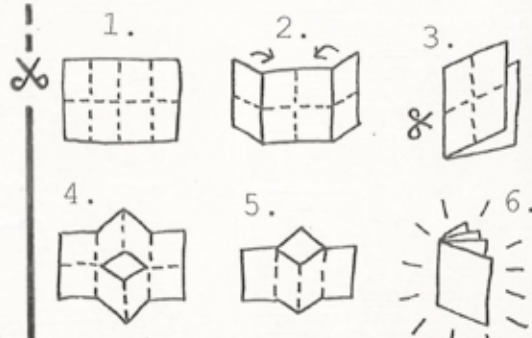

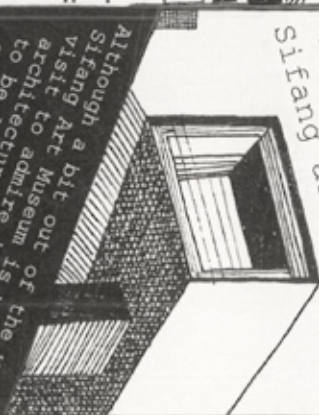

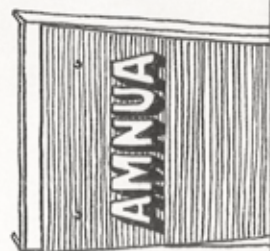

If you are dropping into it's worth Art Museum the Jinling Art Exhibitions where changing stereotypes are reassessed the paintings, and that Chinese and ink. always painted in ink.

Once purely a sacrificial lamb, flowers in the China of today are, like everything else, big business. Opening a shop? Hosting a wedding? The two prerequisites are fireworks and flowers. Then there is Lover's Day, Valentine's Day, Women's Day and so on.

Two and a half thousand years ago it was a very different story. Then, as Buddhism spread into China, it brought with it the custom of offering flowers at temple altars. As an art form, flower arranging was to develop rapidly in the Sui and Tang dynasties, as the region was at relative peace and a higher civilization had been cultivated. Very quickly flower arrangements had become an established part of daily life, a big change from its former function as an item for sacrifice.

Much loved by intellectuals in the Song Dynasty, flower arrangements inspired poems, literati paintings and other artistic works, but the craft was to reach its peak in the Ming Dynasty, during which it enjoyed many developments and innovations in terms of technique and theory, while it was also practiced widely amongst the populace, used in homes and during festive occasions.

The subtleties of the craft were also mastered during the Ming; a burgeoning number of Chinese floral arrangers had perfected techniques placing equal weight on beauty, structure, and meaning, laying the foundations of an Oriental art form which would spread to Japan, Korea, and even Europe and the Americas.

The flowers faltered, however, as the Qing Dynasty weathered its storms; the art form having almost completely disappeared when the People's Republic took charge.


Today, the industry is blooming, but still lags behind florists on an international level. China boasts an impressive 1.3 million florists, yet the Chinese flower market is less competitive than, for example, Holland, which is infamous for flower production.

A lack of legal representation is the snag here. For flower production companies in most countries, it is important to cultivate new strands of species to differentiate their flowers and increase their sales. China has both the re-

sources and ability to do this, but the lag in protection for new varieties has dissuaded companies from innovation in the development of new species.

China's lack of mechanised farming is another factor keeping the flower industry from punching above its weight, while the industry's marketing channels are also far from mature. With small production areas and the majority of sales at fairs and local shops, there is no sufficiently large network to serve as the infrastructure for online sales.

Yet, there remains plenty about which to be positive. While freight costs are a barrier to expansion into the more lucrative markets of Europe and America, Yunnan

province has emerged as China's premier flower grower, buoyed by an increasing domestic acceptance of roses as a symbol of love; their price triples as Valentines Day approaches. Companies such as Nanjing's own Gold God Design have also created a niche for themselves, through innovative displays of preserved flowers, presentation boxes; even jewelry. With such designs brightening people's homes (and bodies), the outlook for flower arranging in 21st century China is looking very rosy!

CHINESE DREAM PROJECT

Matching Majors with Jobs

Inside hall 9 of the Nanjing International Exhibition Centre, at the end of the 20-metre long aisle hangs a string of employment information papers, with the words “not require a specific major” on most of them.

This is a weekly job fair held for more than ten years, a platform for people to find jobs, most of whom are postgraduate job-hunters.

Just as those job-hunters wander in the job fair, Liu Xiangliang and his partners begin their weekly meeting in Cafeteria #2 of Nanjing University's Gulou campus.

In order to help university students find internships, Liu and his partners built a non-profit subscription account on WeChat last year, called “NJU Good Internship”. With Liu's talented leadership and abundance of resources from past intern experience, the account now has more than 30,000 followers. However, Liu has no idea about a future career of his own.

As a first year graduate student in chemistry school in Nanjing University, Liu has not decided on his future occupation yet, except that he won't devote it to chemistry. He did a first internship in the marketing department in Siemens as a junior, and later joined a consultancy, a security company and an Internet growth enterprise in succession. “At first I didn't know what I could do. I wanted to do anything but chemistry. Finally, I found I could do nothing but chemistry,” Liu said.

It is a common phenomenon that nowadays only a few university graduate students work within the fields of their majors. According to a survey last year based on 400 people made by News Express Daily, an influential daily newspaper in Guangzhou, only 30 percent of the graduates work in the areas of their majors. In Chinese, the relevance between major and work is called “duikou”, which means one's work highly matches what one learns in college. The opposite, “buduikou”, probably means a waste of four years of study, since little professional knowledge can be used at work.

While some postgraduate job-hunters are passively driven into the job market, not knowing exactly what they want, some are suffering from digression. It has become a significant question perplexing them; how to match major and job?

Liu is among those lost job-hunters. Five years ago, attracted by the reputation of basic subjects in Nanjing University and confident with his talent for chemistry in high school, Liu chose chemistry as his major independently.

Soon he realized that he would not be a chemist in the future because he wanted something more social and practical. “The chemistry school cultivates 100 chemists but society only needs 10,” said Liu, excluding himself from the “10 chemists”.

He is still lost when asked about career anticipation after one year of graduate school study, during which time he tried more internships. What he attempts to do is just try as much as possible until he finds the “Mr. Right Job”.

In terms of job orientation, only 7 percent of students strictly circumscribe their ideal work with the majors in which they studied, while 56 percent accept jobs pertinent to their majors, shown in a survey conducted by Chinese Education Newspaper last year. Moreover, 18 percent have no profession requirement for their job, while 19 percent refuse to work within their majors.

Wang Yanfeng, a 22-year old journalism school graduate from Sichuan University, departed from her major. However, the departure turns out to be somewhat disappointing but unavoidable.

Wang used to be a student with a “journalism dream”. Four years ago, she decided to major in journalism with the expectation of being a journalist who can make her voice heard in different places. “At that moment I didn't understand deeply”, she said.

Yet the four-year study and practice destroyed her “journalism dream”. Observing the recession of tradition media, she is pessimistic about the media industry. Through previously interested in the depths of paper media, she nonetheless realized through journalistic practice, that many of the valuable stories could not be published because of censorship.

Another realistic factor is the salary. In Wang's words, the pay of newspaper journalists is too low and the work of television journalists is too tiring. At the present, she has renounced her "journalism dream" and anticipates transferring to a more lucrative field; finance, which is one of the top ten highly-paid majors among postgraduate students.

"As the dream cannot be realised, and input and output are not propotional, I gave up," said Wang with a sense of pity.

However, when some graduates abandon their majors, some persevere.

Ji Yue, a graduate of Nanjing University majoring in advertising, has given up a comparatively high-paid job because of the unmatched work to her major.

She used to work as a math teacher for a year in Xueersi, a famous educational institution, where the more classes she taught, the higher she was paid. Based on the salary of ¥266 per class hour, she was able to earn more than ¥7,000 a month by teaching just 8 hours weekly.

Though a more remunerative job compared to those of her classmates, it is not a provident one in her view. "All this is the money made by drudgery. It isn't worth sticking to," Ji said, pointing out the essential reasons for her choice; irrelevance to her major, no improvement space, as well as little chance of promotion.

Preferring a job with a luminous perspective much more related to her profession, she joined the flush of graduate job-hunters in March.

Yang Shenglei, a 31-year old HR in an insurance company occupies a desk in the job fair to search for new hands in his team. Familiar with the bewilderment of university job hunters, he refers to the blank anticipation of their career as the pivotal problem.

"They have no idea what they want to do," Yang says. "As our country has publicized the slogan of 'Chinese Dream', the individuals should have their own dreams."

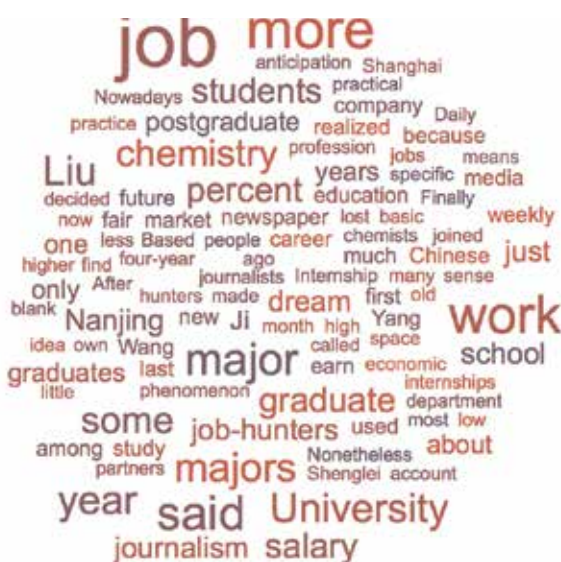
To fill in this blank, as Zhou Yunxia, a sociologist who has done some research on the job market said, universities are supposed to set up reasonable and practical majors to well prepare students to enter the job market. Besides, it is also of great significance for graduates themselves to build a blueprint of their vocations.

Nowadays, as the basic salary for a post-graduate novice is less than half of the salary of a migrant worker, who can earn more than ¥6,000 a month, some students regard higher education of a specific area relatively useless. "Some graduates feel that they've been in education for so many years but earn much less than an illiterate," said Yang Shenglei.

Nonetheless, Ji Yue shows indifference to this phenomenon. "No matter how high their salary is, they have no space of development," she said, insisting on the value of mental work.

After two months of job-hunting, Ji finally received an offer by an economic and trade corporation in Shanghai with the position as an online planner in the economic business department, which involves more about her major.

She is busy with her graduation thesis and renting a room in Shanghai now, anticipating to the new job that is expected to begin in a few months, though she is still a lit bit unsatisfactory. "My classmate has the yearly salary of more than ¥100,000 and there are a lot of high-quality single men in her company. I'm already a loser among the peers of job hunters," she said with a sense of envy, blaming it to her late but accurate decision of finding a new job. **NX**

■ Nestled deep in the midst of Portugal's Douro valley one long night, I found myself with insurmountable insomnia. The taut awakes the result of something even more unnerving than being informed earlier that evening that former UK prime minister John Major had recently slept in the bed in which I now found myself. It was the silence. A still night had rendered the whole vast valley mute, save for the music in the rustle of a leaf when the wind chose to lightly ripple. Portugal's most famous wine region may be stunning to the eye, but is remote and improbably tough terrain for winemaking. The steep limestone slopes are lacerated by dynamite-blasted terraces to make agriculture possible, and these visited by viciously cold winters and searing hot summers with very little rain. The powder-dry schist soil thus requires very deep vinous roots indeed to reach water; valiantly extending as much as 20m to slake their thirst. Deep the metaphorical roots are too, in these difficult hills with evidence for winemaking traditions stretching back to the influence of the Western Roman Empire during the 3rd and 4th centuries. Though it was the British who took full advantage of the valley's only natural gift to winemakers during their long dust up with the French in the 17th and 18th centuries. This being the Douro River which runs from central Spain and ribbons right through the valley to the port of Oporto, the outlet to the sea and the rest of the world. The long river thus enabled a trade where Portugal's wines became synonymous with a sweet and warming accidental nectar (the fortified port style either nicked from a local or used for preserving the wines on a long sea voyage, take your pick) to partner gout and winter fireplaces with a somewhat upper crust tendency (a jarring anomaly being the assault from within the table-lamp friendly Mateus rose bottles which had their moment in the 80's and 90's). It's an image on which the now very international port wine market still thrives.

However, a more cranium friendly wine is emerging from beneath port's wings, with increasing accolade and success, in Portugal's long overlooked table wines (read "not port"), subject to a new Douro dynamism. Part of this redemption has been Portugal's relative isolation, being somewhat liberated by having less of the ubiquitous "international" grapes, Cabernet and Chardonnay, and thus preserving its unique character of grape and terroir; Tinta Roriz (Spain's Tempranillo) and the endemic Touriga Nacional are important red varietals; though the wine in the glass has reflected too much of that improbably tough terrain at times. One such protagonist of the newly tempered indigenous flavours are Symington Family Estates (who owe me a night's sleep) and their name adorns the label on the Altano 2008 (along with a plethora of well known ports). This is pushing the boat out a bit at ¥302 but cuts it at the price, with Tinta Roriz and the lighter Touriga Franca delivering a coppice of plum and dark cherries along with brighter aromas of damson; round and smooth to the touch, yet there's a complexity comprising hints of licorice, smoke, chocolate, and a touch of dry herbs (17 points). A very well made wine, but don't hang around as it's drinking perfectly now with, I would wager, a window of six months before beginning its descent from the apex, find it at Everwines on Changjiang Lu (next to the Six Dynasties museum).

The revolution does not stop with the illustrious Douro either; there's the "new Dao" to the south, shaking off its rustic tag of old with some polished performers that rival Spain's upper echelon, and for a very different terroir perspective, take in the view of the gently undulating wide open plains of Alentejo. Bordering Spain to the east and the Algarve in the south with a geography, flatter and warmer, the Alentejo is conducive to cork production in an industry increasingly challenged by the convenience of the screwcap closure. The area having long held a reputation for the cheerful cheapo, Alentejo's Insólito 2012 (Metro supermarket) is exactly that but certainly not in any pejorative sense. Cheerfully jostling Tinta Roriz (Aragonez as its locally known) and Touriga Nacional for just ¥79 this is a great value, aromatically fruity, but not frivolous, affair; showing a trace of chocolate for intrigue and enough easy-going charm to partner whatever festive bird you care to pluck (15.5 points).

Nanjing Massacre Memorial; Hall 3

■ **S**poiler; December in Nanjing brings with her the spectre of the anniversary of the Naniing Massacre, on the 13th. Newcomers to the city, lucky enough to be reading this in advance, can be forewarned of the ghostly cry of a thousand air raid sirens that shall wail their mournful cry, city wide save for the urban extremities, throughout the day's late morning.

It is said that a visit to the Nanjing Massacre Memorial is not for the faint hearted. Or those of a sensitive disposition. Indeed, were it to be reported adequately by Western television media, the coverage would be preceded by a serious voice and titles along the lines of "this report contains disturbing images".



That acquaintances reported to me of their horror on sufficient occasions, it took me 9 years of living in Nanjing until I felt compelled to make the pilgrimage, and then only in a journalistic capacity, to cover the Massacre's 75th anniversary. Different strokes for different folks. While I did not feel so much horrified, more greatly subdued, it is certainly true to say one should not have anything particularly cheerful lined up for the rest of the day.

It is under this backdrop that Hall 3 of the Nanjing Massacre Memorial opens its doors on 13th December. No

doubt sufficient pomp and ceremony will accompany the air raid sirens, while we can expect dignitaries and anyone with an anti-Japanese axe to grind to be dragged out on parade.

Yet, this is not to underestimate the considerable time, money, effort and resources that have been put into the project.

Not to mention talent. Master architect and professor at the South China University of Technology's school of architecture, He Jingtang, whose previous work includes the wrestling and badminton venues built for the 2008 Beijing Olympics and the Shanghai World Expo China Pavilion, was drafted in, creating a design that is said to highlight success and victory from the ashes. From the air, the new installation resembles two number nine digits, as reference to 9th September, 1945, the day of Japanese surrender.

Promising to be of particular interest is the new star exhibit; a 33-ton, World War II Japanese gunboat (see photo above), seized by the Chinese army during the invasion and later in life put to use as a harbour craft in Yizheng, joining it are many other new exhibits, including an Allied army jeep, recovered from Yunnan province, and over 1,000 never-before seen photos charting victory in the "War of Resistance".

It may be too high on the wish list to think that insensitivities to the Japanese can be swept aside to favour a true telling of the events of 1937 without ulterior political motive. Perhaps, yet it is also worth remembering that, even today, almost every family in Nanjing lost someone during what is one of humanity's darkest periods, wiping out a third of the city's then population. Regret, after all, remains a luxury. **NX**

Prandi Pizza

It is easy to be complacent about the options for western food delivery in Nanjing. The much applauded Sherpa's in Shanghai, Beijing and Suzhou do not dare come near us (largely, I suspect, on account that many a local restaurant claims to “今天没有”) while local effort callmehungry.com didn't last long. Most of the decent names in western cuisine either cannot be bothered to deliver, are still in bed, or will only do so if you pay the taxi. It leaves the average Nanjing Expat that does not live or work in Xianlin, Xinjiekou or along Shanghai Lu feeling, well, pretty hungry.



Imagine therefore, the joy at stumbling across Prandi Pizza one lunchtime in Hexi's New City Mall. Representing, as the name suggests, a fashionable statement in food, Prandi is indeed an eat-in establishment, but one that truly shines when it comes to its delivery service.

The cynical old Nanjinger was not won over immediately; we initially ordered only a pizza, then a week or


two later, just to be sure of the quality witnessed prior, a larger set that was almost enough to fill four office-bound comrades (some did sneak out for noodles afterwards). Nevertheless, for ¥101, delivery included, we feasted on Omurice, a pork Cordon Bleu fillet, mushroom soup and a 12 inch BBQ pizza.

The quality of all items, was excellent. When it came to the acid test of the pizza; we're talking a thin-crust, genuine article that absolutely knocks the socks off two certain American pizza chains and comes only a hair's breadth shy from pizza's alma matter in Nanjing (it would be unfair to stir up a fuss by naming them here; saving that for another day, but trust us on this one).



Away from the aforementioned, Prandi's menu is rounded out with chicken wings and nuggets, calamari rings, fried mozzarella fingers, pasta items, French fries, salad, soups, steak (the only suspicious items on the menu), dessert and much more. That it is all comfort food is not a coincidence, or so we believe.

Comforting, it needs to be, as one need second guess one's stomach's intentions; Prandi needed an hour on both occasions to deliver to us, and we are not much more than just around the corner. The point is almost moot; one needs to be ordering from less than 3km distant anyway. We propose a revolt. Inundate Prandi Pizza with calls for deliveries outwith their miniscule frame of reference. We figure they'll cave, if they know what's good for business. Long live the revolution. Quality pizza for all.



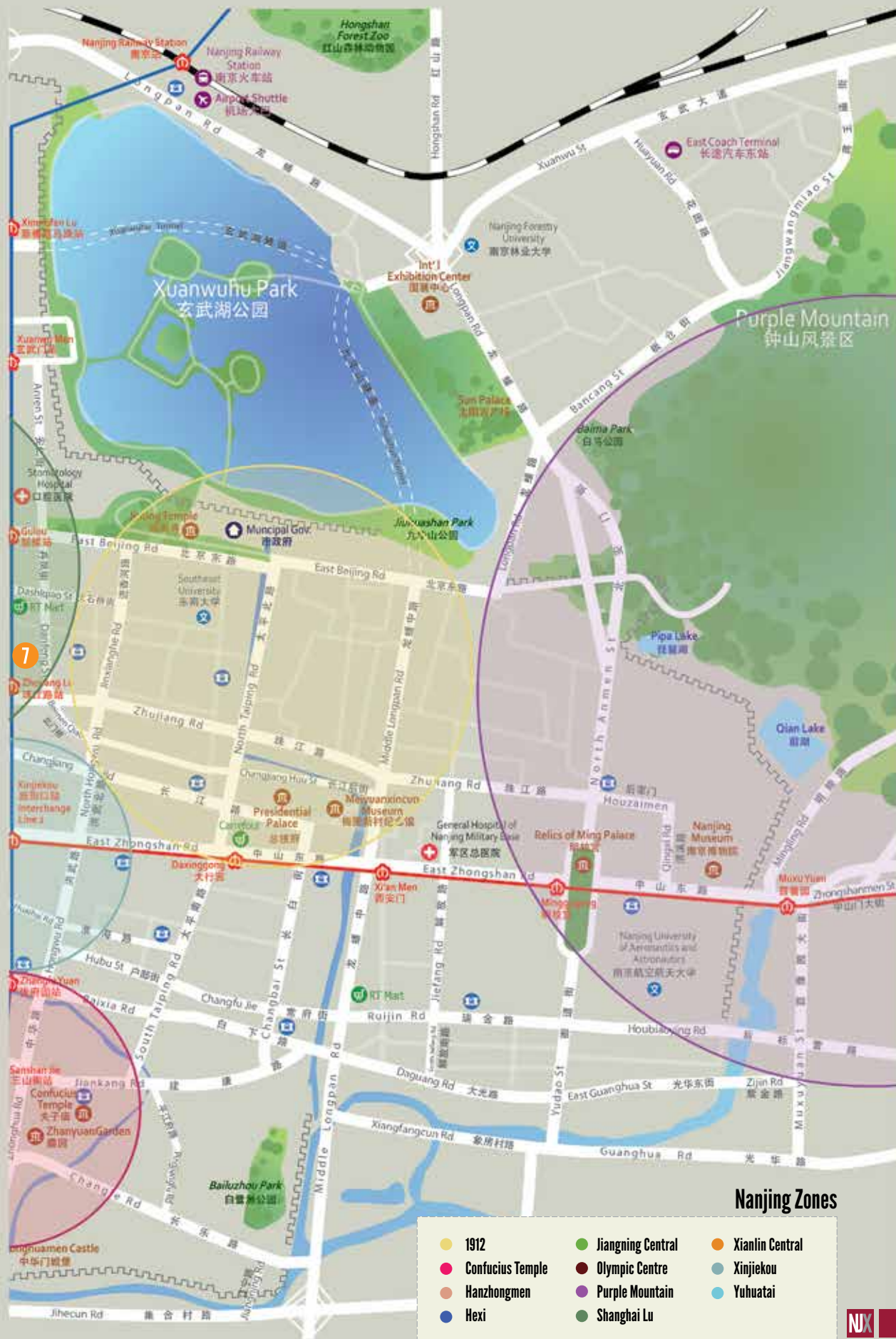

Notes on using The Nanjinger Bus Table

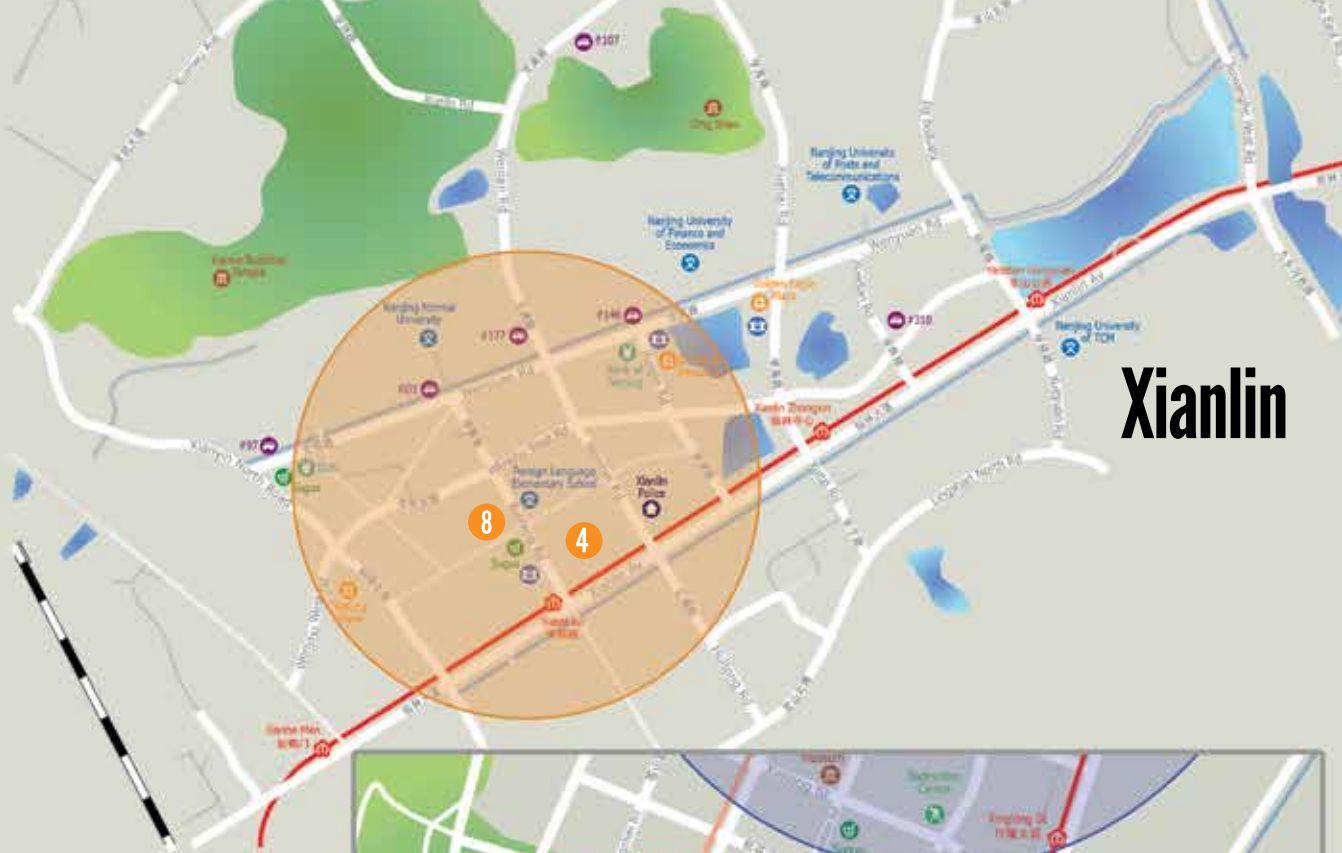

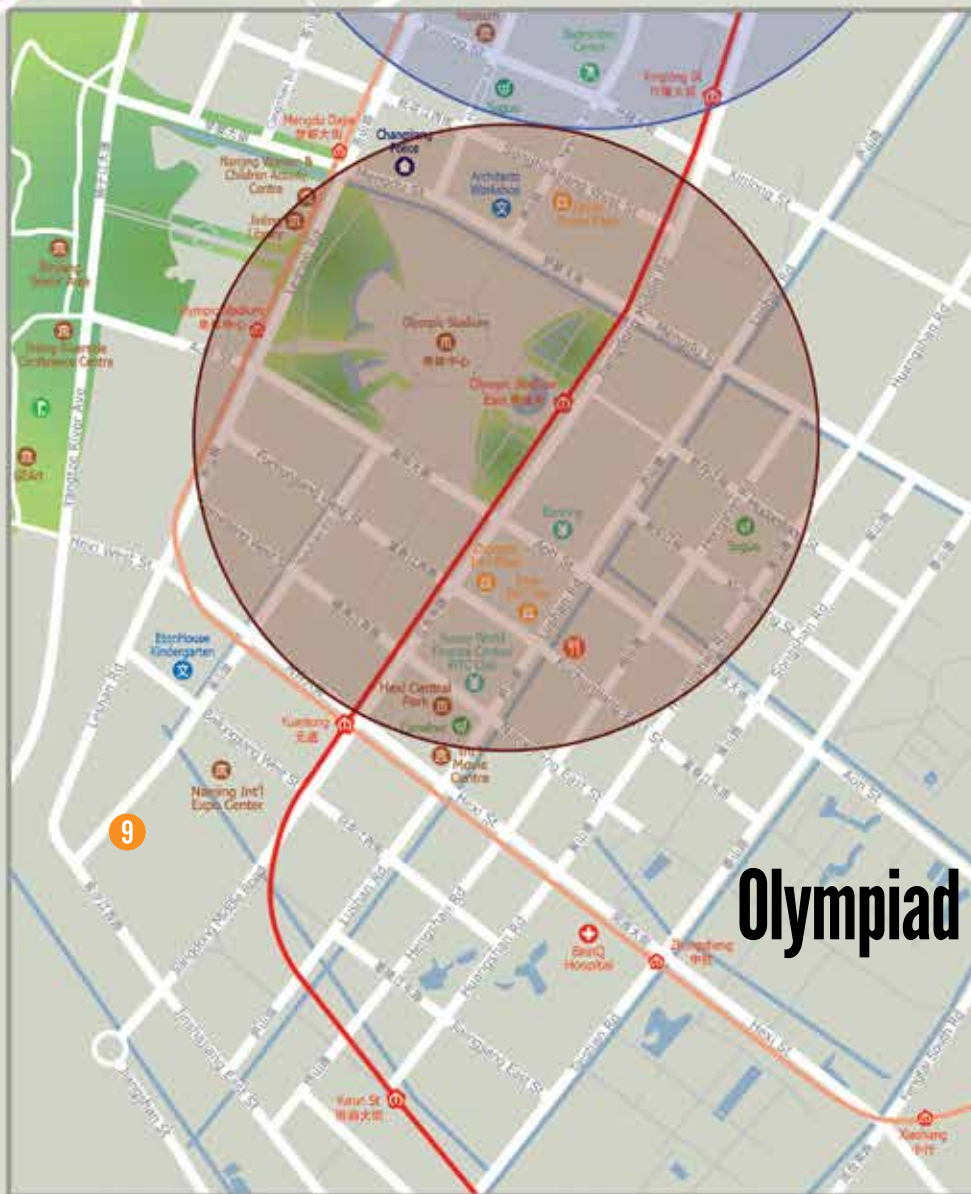

What You Need to Know About Copyright Law in China

■ The Copyright Law of the People's Republic of China (hereinafter referred to as the Copyright Law) adopted on 7th September, 1990, was amended for the first time in 2001 and for the second time in 2010. Amendment to the Copyright Law for the third time is now underway. In addition, there are many other laws, regulations, ordinances and rules about copyright in China. China has also acceded to major international copyright treaties, such as the century-old Berne Convention, the Universal Copyright Convention, and the decade-old Agreement on Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights, or TRIPS Agreement, which set minimum standards for copyright regulation.

Works Protected under Copyright Law in China

Protected works include, among other things, works of literature, art, natural science, social science, engineering and technology, created in any of the following forms:

- (i) Written works
- (ii) Oral works
- (iii) Musical, dramatic, choreographic and acrobatic works
- (iv) Works of the fine arts and architecture;
- (v) Photographic works
- (vi) Graphic works such as drawings of engineering designs and product designs, maps and sketches, and model works
- (vii) Computer software
- (viii) Other works as provided for in laws and administrative regulations

Scope of Copyright Protection

Copyrights that are protected under the Copyright Law in China include the right of publication, authorship, revision, integrity, distribution, rental, exhibition, performance, presentation, broadcast or cinema screening, communication through information network, adaptation, translation, compilation and other rights to be enjoyed by copyright owners.

Term of Protection for the Rights

No time limit is set on the term of protection for an author's rights of authorship and revision and his right to protect the integrity of his work. In respect of a work of a citizen, the term of protection for the right of publication and the related property rights of the copyright is the lifetime of the author plus another fifty years; in respect of a work of a legal


entity or other organization or a work which is created in the course of employment, such a term is fifty years from the first publication of such work; and likewise in respect of a cinematographic work.

Copyright Licensing and Transfer Contracts

Anyone who exploits another person's work shall conclude a copyright licensing contract with the copyright owner, except where no permission need be obtained under the law. Anyone who transfers any copyright should conclude a written contract. Where a copyright is pledged, both the pledger and pledgee shall undergo the formalities for registration with the copyright administration department under the State Council.

How Strict are Chinese Copyright Laws?

A report by an international intellectual property organization found that 90 percent of the DVDs (music, movies and software) distributed in China are unauthorised copies. Music and literature copyright infringement is widely regarded as one of the highest in the world. There are 456 million Internet users in China but no real legitimate online music service. Nearly all the novels of famous writers can be found online and downloaded freely. Moreover, there are also China-based peer-to-peer services assisting in large-scale illegal file-sharing.

However, the landscape of copyright protection in China is changing. In the third amendment to the Copyright Law, China shall authorise the copyright administration department the power of sequestration and the power of seizure, and will raise the amount of penalty for copyright infringement. China even has specialised intellectual property divisions within its courts, and we can therefore expect that China creates an increasingly more protective environment for all copyright owners.
