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

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After a foul October, and as November dawned in Nanjing, the sun decided to poke its head out from behind the grey gloom. Under the blue skies, it was a crisp, fresh. bright morning.

Not so for Nanjing's Second Hand Car Market that lies just off Daming Lu. What was a hive of activity has been reduced to a handful of dealers, each operating out of a ramshackle office in front of which they peddle their wares, more often than not consisting of a Mini Cooper, a Volkswagen Beetle, a Buick Excelle, a couple of Hyundai and the ubiquitous Honda Accord.

Some of the dealers busy themselves washing their cars, painting the tire walls black, opening the bonnet to show off a souped up, polished engine. Today, others are content to sit in the sun. Dealers, it appears, outnumber buyers.

The culprit? Apps. There can be few of us Nanjingers who have not seen the advertisements playing outside office lifts for second hand car apps in which the middle man vanishes before our very eyes. Such C2C sites that connect car owners and sellers directly include Renrenche and Haoche51. Then there is the plethora of other types of platform, from the traditional B2C model that buys used cars and then sells them on to individuals after pocketing their commission, to more innovative C2B examples such as Youxinpai and Cheyipai whereby car owners can sell their car to a dealer under a bidding scheme.

A few years ago, these same salespeople were also sitting around doing largely nothing, albeit for an altogether different reason; Chinese people simply did not want to buy a used car. Until recently, buying a used auto meant making do or settling for less. Then there was the issue of safety; a good proportion of used vehicles for sale in previous years had been in accidents. Used car salesmen in China are no different to elsewhere; the stereotype that they are economical with the truth is, if anything, reinforced by a market that is

less than transparent. Full Service History? Yeah, right.

Now, the worm has turned. Second hand cars are all the rage in China, thanks to a change in public perceptions, the relatively high price of new cars (or astronomical in the case of imports) and changes in policy from those up on high in Beijing who see used cars as an effective way of raising consumption among lower income groups.

Most of the cars sitting out in the sun this November morning at the Nanjing Second Hand Car Market are 3-4 years old. Born here, their retirement destination may be elsewhere in Jiangsu or even further afield, thanks to vehicle emission standards that differ from city to city. What was a middle class family's runaround in Nanjing is shortly to be a taxi in Huai'an.

One upshot from the policy changes that will see many a vehicle more optimistic of their retirement is a scrapping of regulations that prevented cars from being sold across provincial borders, ostensibly to protect local businesses. Nevertheless, more than 300 cities have introduced limitations on used cars sales, while in Beijing, cars may not be sold if failing to meet the National 5 vehicle emission standards (China's equivalent to the Euro V).

There were a total of 24.6 million car sales in China last year (up 4.68 percent year on year, according to the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers) of which used cars accounted for seven million (up a whopping 17 percent year on year). Such growth is really beginning to shake up the status quo in which China was a mirror image to Western developed economies. Sales of second hand cars in the USA, for example, are 2-2.5 times higher than for new vehicles. In China, the reverse is true, or was true.

Back to those apps. Used car sales through online marketplaces have skyrocketed over the last year, as consumers have been drowned in a sea of advertising that persuades them to e-shop as it is cheaper, faster, easier and more transparent. Last August, the hugely popular online reality show "Running Man" found a new sponsor in online second hand car marketplace Xin. com, a snip at ¥180 million.

In the physical world, dealerships generally look to slap 20-35 percent on the asking price for a vehicle, and call that their profit. Online, commission rates run at an average of 3 percent.



While the aforementioned Renrenche has sold over 200,000 cars since its formation in April 2014, and this year hit a monthly peak of 18,000 in July, the numbers still do not add up, especially when there is all that advertising to pay for.

Then again, they may not have to pay for it, or at least some of it. The market leaders in the online second hand car market are all backed by major Internet companies. Renrenche has both Xiaomi and Tencent among its stakeholders, while Baidu reclines in a Renrenche boardroom seat.

The situation is far from without precedent. In the cases of the last two Internet sensations; taxi hailing and food delivery, the industry enjoyed an initial honeymoon, buoyed by capital investment, followed by consolidation, after investment was no longer sustained, with the remainder falling by the wayside; no less than six online car wash services have hit the wall this year alone.

With the taxi app wars, Didi Chuxing was the only domestic outfit to survive. In the competition for our stomachs' attention, Ele.me, Meituan Waimai and Baidu Waimai collectively control 80 percent of the food delivery market.

So it will likely be with the online sales of used cars, with Renrenche in the lead to emerge as the final victor. Not only has the startup raised US\$260 million in investment funding (in just 18 months), it also has a formidable team as founders; Du Xiyong, with his 12 years' experience in auto news editing, and three former Baidu IT engineers.


All is not lost for the car dealerships of old, especially with regard to the sale of imported cars. Local drivers may well be unfamiliar with an imported model and will therefore feel a strong need to see and sit in the vehicle in person before committing to a purchase.

China Auto Logistics, a Nasdaq listed firm that buys and sells imported cars, has grown to become China's largest wholesaler of imported luxury vehicles with a network of 3,000 dealers nationwide. With its belief in the long term growth potential for the industry, the company recently took over a 26,000 sq.m. space in Tianjin to turn it into a massive second hand imported vehicle mall; the fabulously named Car King Tianjin.

Both on and offline, the used car market in China is certainly getting the rattling it deserves, with drivers finally sitting behind the wheels of the reasonably priced decent cars they too deserve. The sooner that message gets through to Nanjing's Second Hand Car Market, the better.

Thinking of buying a used car in China?

The Nanjinger's Auto Correspondent says, "Visit the markets, check prices online and ignore the salespeople. Make friends with someone in the police and ask them to check the car's accident report. Then, and only then, should you make the dealer an offer".

wo bus stops away from the Hopkins Nanjing campus, across from a wonderful exhibit on Ming Dynasty treasures found in Nanjing, was the infamous second hand bike alley. After one month back in Wisconsin teaching myself to ride a bike with the help of a Youtube video made by an NYU student, I was determined to buy a bike and become a part of the Nanjing commuting throng.

I went with two classmates to this alley known for pedalling second hand bikes; unfortunately, they were most likely stolen. I sat looking for a bike that most resembled the Dutch commuter bikes or "fiets" of my childhood. And there she sat, quite unassumingly, the Pretty Sheep 4. She had a nice coat of Purple paint and was ready to attack the streets of Nanjing. Who knows what happened to the Pretty Sheep(s) 1, 2, and 3, or if they even existed at all, but the 4th generation was mine for the taking and she would serve as my trusty steed for my two years in Nanjing.

My first biking adventure was a frightful, fitful, and ambling jaunt through the central streets of Xinjiekou and the clubbing district. Experienced, unafraid bikers who had ridden unsecured as toddlers on the back of their mom or dad's bike, whizzed past me. Somehow, almost being hit by a car did not hurt as much as getting cursed by an older man. I took a break at the park in front of Carrefour and was questioning my desire to become a Nanjing biker. Especially disconcerting were the looks I was getting for my helmet. "Where is she going?" they must have thought, and not in a slow panoramic hair blowing in the wind "who's that girl" kind of way. More like, "What's her problem, feh, lao wai".

After pondering my confidence issues and boiling it down to, "I want to get off campus and I don't have a car, nor want to die driving one", I got back on my bike and proudly rode back to campus where I could protect my new favourite companion.

Before I even knew that my bike had already been christened the Pretty Sheep 4, I had already decided on a name that more accurately fit my weird sense of humour. The "Purple Nurple" was born the day I rode her home from her original place of birth. She was Purple, and the look on people's faces when I told them her name was too priceless, thus the name stuck. The Purple Nurple was instrumental in getting me to and from work, to my yoga classes, to helping me make relaxing rings around town, and to meeting people for coconut mango dessert bowls and kebabs (串儿) late into the night.

Surprisingly, within two very eventful years in Nanjing, the Purple Nurple was never stolen. I got cocky and even left her outside unlocked. When I found her intact without anyone stealing her, I started to wonder if there was something desperately wrong with her. It is almost sad when one starts wondering what is wrong with one's belongings if no one wants to steal them.

In two years, the only thing taken from me was a really nice night light that I mistakenly left on one of Purple's handles outside my yoga class. The lack of interest in my bike by thieves made me love the Purple Nurple even more. I rode her around recklessly like a local with nothing to lose. During Golden Week, when I was invited to bike to Yangzhou from Nanjing, I had no doubt that Purple would survive the trip. Looking back, the Nurple in reality had about as much stamina as an on-sale Walmart bike. However, she rode along highways, over dirt roads, and rested on a ferry like a champ. Bikers along the way either thought that I had an amazing bike or an amazing pair of legs. I would like to think both were responsible for the successful trip.

Despite having some very sore legs, the Purple Nurple helped me to see the sites of a China not offered to most. From crawling along major highways to weaving through towns and busy streets, the Purple Nurple held up over two years with the speed and strength of a 1,000 dollar bike. She is featured so many times in my pictures and memories that she almost became part of the family.

"How's the Nurple?" my mom would unironically ask over Skype. "She's doing well, she gets me everywhere and anywhere", my excitement brimming over at a rate that is usually reserved for a young boy's old junker of a first car.

Over two years, my dependency on cars turned

into a complete lack of understanding of why I would need a car in the first place. Between buses, trains, the subway, the Purple Nurple and the occasional shared or emergency cab ride, why would I want to sit in traffic, when I could lurk from the comfort of the Purple Nurple? I loved my Nurple so much that when it was time for me to leave China, selling her became the last and most painful thing I had to do. I took one last picture and sent Purple on her way with one of my friends who was now the one making a home for herself in Nanjing.



Three years after returning to the US, I went from my ideal life as a cyclist through urban China to being car dependent in Southern California. I would inwardly rage over gas prices and traffic jams, waiting for the weekends when I could set aside some time to cruise on my flea market purchase named Blueberry.

Biking through Southern California does not have the same power as racing through the poorly regulated streets of Nanjing. Despite the constant dangers of my reckless bicycling combined with a public that is fairly new to car culture, I felt safer amongst the crazed various forms of transportation vying for the right of way, than amid the wide lanes of Southern California's suburbs. Instead of being traditional transportation for the masses, biking seemed to be more of a labour for those who could not afford a car, an almost unavoidable necessity in highway consumed South California. I thought of the

Purple Nurple and what seemed like easier days, save for the ones consumed with homesickness, term papers or food poisoning.

The Purple Nurple became a symbol for times where I was not trapped by highways, petrol prices or post academic responsibilities. The Blueberry died tragically after an 8 hour trek along any bike path I could find, with both my legs and blueberry's tires destroyed, it was time to find a new bike. I bought a Purple Nurple lookalike from Amazon that despite its newness, shine and complete lack of history, failed to be comfortable or endearing in any sense. It did not help that I still lacked a bike friendly community and that at this point I was living on the top of a massive hill that blocked any effort I put into mastering the uphill climb.

Soon after I had treated myself to the Purple Nurple's new cousin, a major life change came my way in the form of a new position in the Bay area (Berkeley to be exact). The transition was a difficult one to be sure, but almost like a sign from the heavens, my American Purple Nurple was taken the day before I moved. Since moving to the Bay area. I now have a completely new bicycle called Black Pete (a reference to a somewhat controversial Dutch fictional character). I get to fulfill my dream and previous love of bicycle commuting and my ultimate dream of being able to commute to work without a car. The Black Pete lets me glide along the Ohlone greenway, a bike/walking path lined with art and a major enabler of daydreaming (just be careful of the crossings). The Black Pete is a wonderful reminder of my past and a great part of my present; whizzing through Nanjing on a possibly stolen steed of amazing strength turning into an easy glide controlled by very civilised crossings and extremely uncaring high school students, begrudgingly heading to school. Even in the grey, pouring rain, the freedom of a bike on a quiet path made me so happy, it felt like the same type of freedom I enjoyed in Nanjing while giving drivers heart attacks and blatantly ignoring crossing warnings.

Thank you Purple Nurple, for giving me a sense of freedom that I have brought with me back to the US after a wonderful and terrifying two years in Nanjing.



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




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Surf Green Surf Clean

Growing up. I was made aware of what was to be handed down to me after there was to be a death in the family, what family heirloom, so precious it was priceless would some day be mine. Crystal is always given, jewellery perhaps or a pocket watch for the boys, but it was silk for the ladies that was always one of the most prized possessions. True, the silk handed down in my family probably was not the finest of Chinese silk but during the days of my ancestors it was. Wealthy aristocratic women from the Roman, Greek and English empires admired Chinese silk so much its beauty became legend.

"I can see clothes of silk, if materials that do not hide the body, nor even one's decency, can be called clothes... Wretched flocks of maids labour so that the adulteress may be visible through her thin dress, so that her husband has no more acquaintance than any outsider or foreigner with his wife's body"; Seneca the Younger (c. 3 BCE - 65 (E), Declamations Vol. 1. Perhaps unsurprisingly therefore, the Roman Senate famously tried to ban all imports of luxury Chinese silk and commodities on economic and moral grounds.

Chinese legend states that (very similar to another Chinese legend talking of the origins of tea) silk was discovered by Xi Lingsui, Emperor Huang Di's illustrious wife, when a silk cocoon dropped into her hot tea; fine threads unravelled and voila, silk was born. Silk became a precious commodity within China and was strictly enjoyed by royalty. It became a source of trade within China and not before long China began using it as a means of international currency on what was to become known as the Silk Road.

Initially as a means to transport only silk, but over thousands of years the Silk Road assisted in the development of some of the greatest civilizations on earth, that of China, the Indian subcontinent, Persia, Europe, the North of Africa and Arabia.

Listed as a world heritage site and believed to be anywhere from 4-7,000 miles long, what we now know as the Silk Road began materialising as early as the 1st century BCE. Efforts made by the Chinese saw a expansion of it linking the Hexi Corridor (Gansu Corridor) to the Mediterranean around 130 BCE. By the end of the 1st century a maritime route was also up and running, connecting trading ports that included Java, Hanoi, Goa and as far as Zanzibar and Alexandra. Merchants along the Silk Road came primarily from Indonesia, China, India, Persia, Arabia, Somalia and Europe.

Dreadfully inhospitable deserts and mountain ranges was what surrounded a host of cases that provided refuge to the merchants. Caravans would eventually reach China having journeued from the north. Traders would travel through the Hexi Corridor in order to finally reach the great capital of Changan (what is now Xi'an). The Hexi Corridor was the northern link of the Silk Road that ran northwest from the Yellow River.

As early as the 1st century BCE, silk started appearing in Siberia, after having journeyed through the Hexi Corridor. To the south lies the hostile Tibetan Plateau and to the north the Gobi desert and the savannahs of Outer Mongolia.

During the Han and Tang dynasties, Changan played a major role in events along the Silk Road. As the first point of entry into China via land, this city was a major source of international exchange and multiculturalism, thriving with the hustle and bustle of exotic trade as well as cultural and philosophical exchange. The ancient marketplace that was situated at Changan West Market was a meeting place for music, entertainment, trade along with cultural and language exchange. The Silk Road was reopened during the Tang dunasty and overseen by China's only reigning Empress, Wu Zetian. When she died representatives from over 61 countries attended to her funeral.

Over the years, demand grew and grew until eventually jade, fine porcelain and silk were among some of the most popular luxury items sought after in aristocratic European circles. The Chinese understandably became outré protective of their products that the Great Wall was expanded in order to protect it. Anyone caught smuggling out silk worms was executed. "The art and civilization of the Silk Road achieved its highest point in the 8th century. Western civilization began to reach China in the late 6th century with the assistance of Arab middle men. In China, the Tang Dynasty had united the country and its capital, Changan...had a population of two million people and an estimated five thousand foreigners"; University of California at Irvine

Aside from what was obviously traded and exchanged along this route, perhaps the biggest legacy of the Silk Road is its exchange and influence of culture, belief systems, philosophy, technology, foodstuffs and luxury items.

Among foods imported into China were walnuts, sesame seeds, alfalfa, string beans, onions, cucumbers, carrots and exotic fruits such as watermelons, peaches, pomegranates and figs. "Most popular food: raisins, nuts, dairy and fruit products in Xinjiang, Muslim beef noodle soup in Lanzhou, roujiamo (like hamburgers) and shish kabobs in Xi'an"; Seasdrams.org.

Central Asia exported camels to China along with, military equipment, gold and silver, semi-precious stones and glass items. Other goods included wool, cotton fabrics, gold embroidery, fat—tailed sheep and hunting dogs, leopards and lions. Roman glassware was even found in Nanjing tombs dating from 25–220 BCE.

Mediterranean rugs, carpets, curtains and blankets started to appear. Being unfamiliar with the methods of producing and processing wool, the Chinese greatly welcomed and well harnessed the future techniques of weaving. "Knowledge of winemaking passed eastwards from the Middle East to China, while the idea of noodles moved the

opposite direction"; The Economist.

"Heavenly Horses" from the Greek kingdoms of central Asia were greatly sought after by the Emperor of the Han Dynasty and were brought along the 5ilk Road into western China; descendants of these horses are still around today. The game Polo was introduced to China over 1,000 years ago and, just as in the West, was thoroughly enjoyed by aristocrats.

During this time it was Indian missionaries who took Buddhism along the Silk Road where it later spread to Japan and Korea. Reaching China during a time of upheaval and struggle, Buddhism gave the Chinese something to put their faith in and it flourished. Various places and communities along the Silk Road added to and changed the original teachings, turning it into what we now know as Chinese Buddhism.

As much as the Silk Road became a vital means of culture and luxury trade for imports to China, in return what China handed down to the world turned out to be some of the most important inventions and commodities of all time.

To name but a few, China handed down to the world gun powder, papermaking, printing, the compass, porcelain, silk, tea, Chinese medicine, thin and delicate porcelain, bronze ornaments and mirrors, umbrellas, and perfumery. Along the Silk Road, merchants also carried tea and rice, corals, amber and asbestos. Additional products dug up from the Gobi desert also include turtle shells, spices, ceramics, cinnamon, ginger plus iron items and bronze weapons. That's not all; then came the abacus, locks, clocks, crossbows, fireworks, the sail and rudder, the spinning wheel, stirrups, the umbrella, zero, kites, the seed drill, noodles, alcohol, acupuncture and toilet paper. Above all however, the most sort after amongst the European elite were fine silks, the thinnest of porcelain and tea.

The transportation of goods by land was not the only means of travel; maritime trade became widely and effectively used, later to become known as the Spice Routes.



These routes supplied markets across the world with cinnamon, pepper, ginger, cloves and nutmeg mainly from the Moluccas islands in Indonesia (the Spice Islands). Technology, science and navigation, astronomy, and shipbuilding were exchanged. Dynamic coastal cities grew around frequented ports such as Alexandria, Muscat, Zanzibar and Goa.

Along with goods, foods, philosophies and religions, disease also ran along the Silk Road; there is evidence to suggest that the bubonic plague, anthrax and leprosy actually came from the Silk Road. However, "researchers [did] excavate 2,000-year-old feces from a latrine along the Silk Road in northwestern China, and found that it contained eggs from the Chinese liver fluke, a parasitic worm that is typically found at least 930 miles (1,500 kilometres) away"; LiveScience, Charles Q Choi.

In order to protect traders along the Silk Road from bandits, General Zhang Qian of the Han Dynasty and his army were dispatched to the road in order to provide security for the roads and to establish trade relationships with other countries; a tradition that started almost 2,000 years ago and is now enjoying a revival thanks to China's "One Belt, One Road" plan.

Essentially a restoration of the old Silk Road, the One Belt, One Road links China to the world again in order to create a thriving trading ground. The "New Silk Road" includes Dubai, Beijing, Mumbai, Chennai, Tokyo, Doha, Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, and Riyadh.

"It will connect China with Southeast Asian countries, Africa and Europe... known as the Silk Road Initiative. Neither the belt nor the road follows any clear line geographically speaking; they serve more as a roadmap for how China wants to further integrate itself into the world economy and strengthen its influence in these regions. Many of the countries have traditionally had close trade and investment relations with China, which

says they should deepen cooperation, especially in terms of building infrastructure and other development projects. The strategy underlines the government's push to have a bigger say in global economic and political affairs, and to export China's technologies and production capacity in oversupplied areas such as steel manufacturing": Caixin.

However China's new Silk Road plan has met some criticism: there are those who say it is merely a means of trade war over America's domination of the Panama Canal, others suggest simply a plan hatched by Xi Jinping that was not carefully thought out or planned. "Simply put, China is trying to buy friendship and political influence by investing massive amounts of money on infrastructure in countries along the "One Belt, One Road...No matter how cash-flush Beijing is, it will be impossible for China to keep pumping cash into these regions like that", claimed Willy Lam Wo-Lap of Eijnsight.

China has been implementing its One Belt, One Road plan since 2013; seven cities along it have already prospered from it, growth that includes economic and development prosperity; Lanzhou (China), Khorgos (China / Kazakhstan), Terespol (Poland), Alyat (Azerbaijan), Colombo and Hambantota (5ri Lanka) plus Anaklia (Georgia). "By striking up economic and cultural partnerships with other countries, China cements its status as a dominant player in world affairs", commented Anna Bruce—Lockheart of the World Economic Forum.

New or old, the legend of the Silk Road and all the many types of goods passed down from East to West have inevitably facilitated the shaping of some of the greatest civilisations on Earth, in terms of increased multiculturalism as well as language, technological and scientific progress and ideas. The new Silk Road may only have economic intentions but there remains hope that it also continues to help break down barriers and assist in bridging more than one kind of gap between East and West.

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
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Priceless & Timeless

"And how much for this vase, is it Ming?" A man joked as he picked up a jar from a table spread at a car boot sale last weekend. They chuckled, he put the vase down and didn't buy it.

What if it was Ming? I suppose it would be rather more special, perhaps more beautiful and certainly a few more kuai. But what is it about "the Ming vase" and why do we associate it with the utmost value?

Chinese porcelain first reached Europe one piece at a time as early as the fourteenth century but it was not for another three centuries until porcelain, and in particular blue and white porcelain, became a popular and relatively widespread commodity in Europe. Without the knowledge or technology to make it locally, the illusive material was a thing of wonder; hard and polished, decorative and made into exquisite forms. Porcelain was cheaper than silver; it was also hygienic and a symbol of status.

Blue and white Ming porcelain was readily assumed into local material culture but it also became something more than a mere object. It found starring roles in crime novels, magical tales and even biblical depictions, worshiped for its value and prized for its fragility.

The still life opposite, by Dutch painter Willem Kalf, from 1656, reveals plenty of the complex ideas bound up with this precious Chinese export. In his painting, a blue and white bowl tips under the weight of citrus fruits whose knobbly rough skins contrast with the lustrous shine of the bowl's edge. Suspended in perfect balance, the bowl bows down to a glistening silver jug and an elaborately mounted goblet, whose indulgence and exoticism place the humble bowl on a pedestal.

In the seventeenth century, Dutch national wealth increased and the emergence of a middle class meant more people could afford ceramics. Much in the same way people to-day post photos on social media of their latest purchase or their recent holiday to attract the attention of others, so too did the Dutch duplicate their precious belongings in paint to show off their lifestyle and wealth.

The bowl in Kalf's painting was clearly a prized possession, one to display the owner's wealth as well as a trophy of

Dutch successes in global exploration and trade with China. It is a kind of, wait for it, kraak bowl, identified by its decoration divided into panels, and was a popular export ware on the Dutch market at that time.



How one bowl and other Ming ceramics came to be represented in Dutch culture was also greatly down to artists themselves, who employed their painterly expertise to mold an identity for Ming porcelain. Oil paint allowed Kalf to capture the bowl's rich colours in this painting, luminescent against a dark background, as well as the sharp reflection of light off its rim. The artist too could gather more pennies by painting the bowl again and again, pairing it with evermore-luxurious objects and demanding a higher price from his buyer.

In 1644, calamity hit China when the Ming dynasty was overthrown by the Qing, leading to a sudden decline in ceramic export to Europe. True porcelain was first produced in Germany in 1708 and since then, the exotic and magical qualities of porcelain have been in constant decline. Our crockery today come from shelf and not ship, exactly the same as the rest in the cupboard. Yet, still today we have maintained the romantic notion of the beautiful and treasured priceless Ming vase.

Stir It Up by Ella Fisher

CRACKER!

- For the past few months, I have focused on traditional Chinese herbs and spices. but for this issue I am going to cook using a key ingredient that features in nearly all Chinese cookery: the humble egg. Find it in noodles, rice, dumplings, soups, stir fries, curries, stews: the list could just go on and on! For me, eggs give Chinese cuisine a unique texture and subtle background flavour I now expect to experience in my fried rice or noodles. However, I wanted to make a dish where the egg is the main component and taste. Everyone will know and has eaten this particular dish, and it includes another key ingredient I did not think would feature in Chinese food... tomato. As basically stir fried egg and tomato, I would not have thought a dish using these two ingredients would taste so authentically Chinese, but cook this the right way, and it really does taste amazingly both sweet and sour; I can't get enough of it. Here is the recipe and step by step method I used:
 - 4-6 eggs (depending on how big they are!)
 - 2-3 tomatoes, diced or chopped
 - 2 spring onions, chopped (quite thickly; use both the white and green bits)
 - 1 tbsp oil (any flavourless cooking oil is fine; NO SESAME OIL)
 - Pinch of salt and pepper (white or black is fine)
 - 1-2 tsps rice vinegar
 - A few pinches of sugar

As another vegetarian dish, it costs very little to buy all the ingredients. I bought my veggies and eggs from my local wet market which turned out cheaper than buying them from a supermarket and they tasted much better too. So if you can, try and find a market near you; it's definitely worth it.

Into a bowl, add the eggs and the white parts of the spring onions. Beat well and add the salt and pepper too. Then grab your wok and heat up ½ tbsp of oil. Wait until the

oil is quite hot, but not smoking otherwise the eggs will burn! I always test the oil by putting a bit of onion in the pan, and when the onion starts bubbling in the oil, then the eggs are ready to go in.

Once the oil is hot enough, add the eggs. Do not mix them at this point; leave the egg for a couple of seconds until the outside of the egg mixture starts to cook and colour a light yellow, then start mixing, making sure the egg breaks into pieces. Cook for 1-2 minutes until they are almost cooked through. Remove from wok.

Add the remaining oil to the pan. In a bowl, mix the tomatoes, sugar and vinegar and then cook in the wok. Stir VERY gently, as you do not want the tomatoes to disintegrate and become a paste. You should cook until you can see the juices running out of the tomatoes and you can smell they have turned sweet and sour. I would advise tasting the tomatoes now so you can alter their seasoning, if they are too sweet, add a bit of vinegar; too sour, add sugar.

Once the tomatoes are cooked, return the egg to the pan and add the green part of the onions, mix together gently until the tomato and egg is evenly distributed. Tip into a bowl and serve.

This dish took me 15 minutes to make; not long to create a very tasty dish! It really did taste very authentic and I loved the contrast of the sweet and sour tang in my mouth; a perfect Chinese style breakfast! It's only problematic aspect is that you need a light touch of hand... which I do not possess. Many a time I stirred the eggs and tomatoes too vigorously and the dish turned into a horrible mush! Stir gently and you will have a great meal that delivers both on texture and flavour. Don't be scared to try it out; sometimes you need to crack a few eggs to make something delicious.

Traditionally and officially, the colour red undoubtedly represents China. It embodies a sense of power, good fortune and joy, so it is no wonder red wine has been embraced like non other in todays modern China. Along with other luxuries such as coffee. Dior and beef. China's rapidly growing middle class talk more of tucking in to a steak with a class of red than they ever have before.

Wine is nothing new to China: the earliest known desecration of the grape dates back 4,600 years. Wine consumption, once present in the Bronze Age, was replaced by a range of other alcoholic beverages made from millet, rice, and fruits such as lychee. Wine making was, however, kept alive in the west of China at a state on the Silk Road near modern day Xinjiang during the Tang dynasty.

The Uighur homemade wine called

"museles" can still be found today.

The method requires grapes to

be crushed by hand, strained using the Uighur atlas silk and

boiled with water and sugar.

The wine is later stored in

clay urns and sold togeth-

er with medicine.

In 1980. Cognac giant Remy Martin was the first to enter China and ioin up with domestic brand Dynasty, creating the first wine production joint venture. Fast forward to 2016 and there are thousands of businesses in China either offering help in importing wine into China and/or selling it here.

It seemed like vesterday when the only sightings of a copa de vino were at the many tables of businessmen; each prominently displaying the labels on their bottles to ensure Mr. Partner-to-be had a clear shot at which Chatau la Tuilerie du Puv he was drinking. It feels like just the other day that rich Chinese youths at dinner parties were requesting cans of coke to go with their expensive red in order to dilute the taste... sacrilege... utter sacrilege.

Nevertheless, this acquired taste business is a clear thing of the past. The Chinese have embraced red wine culture, taste and effect properly and they love it. Red. white and rose wines can nowadays

be found pretty much anywhere in all major cities in China. And business is booming. According to Vinexpo. by 2017, (with Hong Kong included) China will lead the world's top ten consumers of wine.







From 2007-2016, both domestic production and the import of wine has risen dramatically. Wine Intelligence has compared "Chinese urban upper-middle class imported wine drinker" habits, splitting them into six categories; Frugal Occasionals (15 percent), Health Sippers (16 percent), Social Newbies (23 percent), Adventurous Connoisseurs (7 percent), Prestige-Seeking Traditionalists (19 percent) and Developing Drinkers (19 percent). The last two are most worthy of note; while some spend big based on symbolism and social status, a similar proportion are "consumers developing a habit of drinking wine because they like the taste".

State clampdowns on government spending and corruption did have an impact on the wine industry but only minor. Just as in the craft beer revolution, as laws and import tariffs relax, with wine too China is selling an escalating number of the smaller, family owned, but all the more tasty, brands from around the world.

On 10th October 2016, China wine tasters won the ultimate prize for dedicated fans of the grape, scooping first place at the International Wine Tasting competition in France. This fierce contest is held annually and is incredibly tough and competitive. To succeed, participants need research every well-known wine from around the world; they must be knowledgeable about identifying wines' countries of origin, grape varieties, vintages, producers and appellation. The Chinese team this year smashed the competition, putting France second; the US third and former raining champs

Spain in 10th place. Organisers of the event called it a "thunderbolt in the wine world"

While wine imports continue to sore, local quality production is also on the rise; "the country has begun to devote an increasing amount of its land to vineyards. Last year it had 799,000 hectares (1.97 million acres) of land dedicated to growing grapes, second only to Spain worldwide... In 2011, a Chinese winery beat a host of French rivals to collect an international gold medal for one of its wines", reported the BBC.

So, what is in store for the future of wine in China? Avid China wine blogger Jim Boyce, recently published an article about the Chinese sending wine into space. He noted, "It raises intriguing questions; will vintages be counted in light years? Are space-borne yeasts feasible? Will flying winemakers be called rocketing winemakers?" Whatever the future holds, I think it is safe to say wine has made its mark in China and with a growing number of female middle-class drinkers, who knows, wine may even come to surpass long time contenders baijiu and beer.

A report by wine merchants Barry Bros. and Rudd, released in 2008 predicts China will emulate premium Bordeaux in 50 years. "I absolutely think China will be a fine wine player rivaling the best wines from France", said Jasper Morris of Master Wines. "It is entirely conceivable that, in such a vast country, there will be pockets of land, terrain and micro-climate well suited to the production of top quality wines".





Glass teacups. Maybe you have seen them. Some of them have two glass walls, inside and outside, forming a vacuum cavity. They look pretty cool. They feel nice and bulbous in the hands. Not fragile. All one piece. An engineering marvel. And the point of this vacuum technology is to keep your tea as furiously hot as tea should be, without ever scalding your hands.

Now, just supposing that's true... just supposing they really do keep the tea piping hot... supposing the heat doesn't dissipate through convection by means of that gaping aperture at the top...

Why would anyone want to protect their hands from a scalding liquid only to place said scalding liquid in their mouth? This is just one example of dubious innovation in tea technology.

Another is the tea tower. The tea tower has two chambers; a top chamber and a bottom chamber. The two are separated by a filter and a trap door. Hot water is allowed to steep with tea leaves in the top chamber. The trap door is then opened, pure liquid falling through the filter into the bottom chamber, itself a glass pouring jug.

As with the vacuum cups, transparency is crucial to the concept of the tea tower; everyone loves the simplicity and sensibility of this perspex panopticon.

But in this case, the transparency is short lived. The upper chamber is near impossible to clean. Even if the cheaper, yellowing, plastic portions were replaced with the same glass as the jug part, no orthodontist's brush could reach the tannin deposits in the complex filter mechanism. Another noble failure.

Now, let me tell you about the gaiwan (盖碗); a small lidded bowl. This is the tool of choice for gongfu cha (功夫茶). It is part of a set and using it is part of a process. All of that clinking and leaking hints at inefficiency. The industrialised mind looks at it and ponders how this sequence of actions could be unified. And isn't it all unnecessarily poncey?

No.

Some tea leaves refuse to cooperate with water that is not furiously hot. But no one wants such hot water in their mouth, any more than they want leaves there. Transferring and filtering the liquid between vessels allows it to become a drinkable liquid in record time.

It gives unparalleled control over the parameters of tea steeping. In addition, since it never dumps on you a huge jug to glug through, it invites you to review these judgments on a continual basis.

I like the fact that it felt slightly unintuitive the first time I tried it. I like the fact that it forced me to develop calluses on my fingers and thumb.

I further remind you that gongfu cha is modular; as well as adding elements like smelling cups or bathing toads (explanation next month), it is possible to streamline it too. I once remember watching a TV documentary about a stressed Shanghai businessman; a man who sipped straight from his gaiwan. Heroic action.

I love the idea of new technologies overturning current conventions. But for now, for Oolongs especially, there is nothing to touch this lovely lidded bowl.

ARE YOU SMART ENOUGH TO BE WISE?

We are all very well aware of the need for good dental hygiene. We know about plaque control, cavity prevention and most of us brush our teeth after every meal and visit their dentist regularly.

Many pet owners, however, do not realise their animals have the same needs. According to the American Veterinary Dental Society, more than 80 percent of dogs and 70 percent of cats will develop gum disease by the age of three years.

The problem begins when plaque and calculus are allowed to build up on the pet's teeth, especially below the gum-line, potentially causing periodontal disease, receding gums, bad breath, infection and eventually tooth loss. Furthermore, bacteria in the teeth and gums can also enter the bloodstream and lead to even more severe health risks, such as heart, liver and/or kidney problems.

Pet owner dental care partly involves taking pets to the veterinarian for routine dental check-ups. In addition, regular athome dental care is also a crucial part of a pet's dental care, but it cannot correct a problem. Moreover, if there is a painful condition in the mouth, brushing will obviously be very unpleasant for the animal. Therefore, a home-care program should be started after a thorough oral evaluation to ensure that there are no problems that need to be attended prior to commencing brushing.

The goal of brushing our pets teeth is to remove plaque before it becomes firmly attached to the tooth surface and mineralises to become tartar (that hard brown stuff). Plaque will form on a clean tooth within hours and can start to turn into tartar within a few days. This is the reason why it is essential to brush our pets teeth at least every other day; ideally, daily. Longer intervals between brushing will provide no benefit.

Most dogs enjoy interacting with their owners and many will come to see having their teeth brushed as a playful time that

they may eventually look forward to. Pet toothbrushes come in two main designs; one that fits over the finger and one that has a handle. A soft child's toothbrush is an inexpensive alternative to purchasing a toothbrush specifically for pets. When brushing the teeth, keep the brush at a 45-degree angle and use small circular movements, paying special attention to where the teeth meet the gums.

Pet toothpaste and human toothpaste are not interchangeable. Fluoride contained in our toothpaste is toxic to our pets.

It is the brushing that does most of the cleaning. In fact, there is no valid research to show that many veterinary home care products currently on the market are of any benefit.

Dental care for cats is similar to dental care for dogs, but it definitely can be a little daunting experience at first and one that neither pet owner nor pet may look forward to. For this reason, it is important to start as early as possible so that cats are adjusted to having their mouths opened when they are kittens. Initially, one may use a finger covered with gauze to brush over the teeth and gums. This will help the cat adjust to the intrusion and can later be replaced with a toothbrush. Patience is key.

A greater awareness of canine and feline dental disease amongst veterinary practitioners and pet owners greatly contributes to the early recognition and prevention of dental problems. This is important, because dental disease may have a serious impact on a pet's well-being and general health. Great advances have been made in veterinary dentistry and a wide spectrum of dental therapeutic options are now available.

THE ITALIAN JOB

The are called the "The Magnificent Eight", China's most successful entrepreneurs, namely Ren Janxin (ChemChina), Tian Guoli (Bank of China), Wang Shi (Vanke), Nianxa Xu and Liang Xinjiun (Fosun), Zhang Jindong (Suning), Liu Donghua (Poly Group) and Shu Yinbiao (State Grid).

When this collection of riff-raff sat down to lunch with the Italian prime minister Matteo Renzi during his recent visit to China for the G20 in Hangzhou, the meeting sent out a powerful message; Italy is not only very serious about China, but it is also commanding a respect from the Chinese that shows Italy is more than punching above its weight when it comes to trade with China.

To put a number on it, Italy is presently China's number 4 European trading partner, behind the three giants that are Germany, France and the UK. One factor very much in play when it comes to explaining the phenomenon is the sheer quantity of Sino-Italy cooperative institutions; Fondazione Italia Cina, China-Italy Chamber of Commerce, Italian Trade Agency, Associazione Donne Italiane a Shanghai, Instituto Italiano di Cultura, Italian University Professor Association of Eastern China as well as less formal organisations such as the Associazione Giovani Italiani in Cina, to name but a few.

Speaking with The Nanjinger, Stefano Beltrame, Italian Consul General in Shanghai, commented, "Our relationship can be improved and increased in several areas, like health care, environment protection, food safety. Those are all sectors where the role of institutions is very important, because there is political control and institutional support".

Carlo D'Andrea, Vice Chairman of the European Chamber's Shanghai Board said, "The relations between Italy and China are growing year by year. Unity is very important and the organisations and the Italian offices should keep close contacts with their Chinese equivalent and actually, this is what has been happening in the last few years. In Nanjing there has been a working group of Italian companies for quite some long time, which represents the biggest investment in Jiangsu from the Italian point of view".

Earlier this year, it was revealed that the legendary Milan FC would pass into Chinese hands when former Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi announced that his group Fininvest had agreed to the sale for 740 million Euros. It is the highest profile case amid a slew of acquisitions of Italian companies by Chinese investors. Those who are alarmed can take solace in that, thanks to these investments, some niche Italian fashion or regional food products may be saved from the fragile European economies that threaten their very existence.

Politics and international Mergers & Aquisitions aside, it should also not be underestimated just how much the little country's cuisine has done to put Italy into China's conciousness.

Giuseppe Parisi has been bringing authentic Italian tastes to Nanjingers for 16 years, beginning at Bella Napoli in its original location on Hongwu Lu to buying up Bellini in February of this year. He recalled, "When we started, I remember only one company imported material from Europe. So difficult to find cheese, and very very expensive".

Tastes of Parisi's faithful patron's have also become a lot more sophisticated; now Chinese people know what they want from their Italian food. Parisi remarked it is now common to hear customers say, ""I want noodles Italian style; hard'. Before, you give hard to a Chinese, impossible. They wanted soft. Not soft a little, soft a lot!"

In a gesture of solidarity, representatives of the Italian business community recently dined in Bellini on Amatriciana Pasta, as part of an initiative whereby Italian restaurants all over the world raise funds to help reconstruct parts of central Italy devastated by the August earthquake.

■ The lady next to me gasped when an unexpected screech burst from one of the dancers. The woman in front frantically snapped the camera button on her phone, then there rippled all around the sound of shutters and whispers.

Filled with the best of Nanjing's glitterati and ultra-chic upper class, this Soho-esque gathering was assembled for only one reason; to watch the latest performance by the KheN dance group. Blessing Nanjing's artistic scene, this unexpected piece of dance theatre was a refreshing delight.

Dramatically elegant story telling spoke of a changing Chinese youth through the eyes of modern middle upper class Chinese women. Focusing on the struggles of intense relationships, gossip and power, this piece helped highlight parts of a modern Chinese psyche.

With the use of minimal props and the audience situated on all sides of the act, the dancers did a fantastic job utilising what they had in order to help tell the story better. Abstract gestures saw the dancers riding to the rhythm of each other and the music.

Audience members appeared struck by immense emotion while others simply peered over their phones with a perplexed look wondering what on Earth was this all about. In order to portray a certain sense of intimacy and strong emotion, it was the techniques used by the dances that allowed for this. Rarely did the women move in unison so completely as to render the display of feelings we so often experience in intense relationships.

@ the Tapa the Food Chain; Brownstone Lounge and Bar

As the weather gets colder, we are moving into the time of year where we long for nice, cozy places to relax and unwind. Brownstone, an upscale bar and tapas restaurant located at the base of Zifeng Tower, offers one such respite.

Billing itself as a lounge just as much as an eatery, Brownstone boasts a warm red-brick interior (perhaps it should be called redstone?) and friendly staff, the majority of whom speak English. The lounge area here is a standout, featuring comfy booth style seating as well as candle-lit dining at night. The atmosphere toes the line between cool and cozy, and often somehow manages to be both at once. It would be very easy to sit back, order a drink and a few tapas, and pass the time with good company, and indeed this reviewer has done just that on several occasions.

The bar area offers an exciting change of pace, with a DI playing on select nights, video clips being projected on the wall behind the booth, and, on occasion, fireworks. Yes, you read that right! On the chance you go on a special occasion, the bartender may set off sparklers the size of road flares to add an extra spark to your celebration. Though Brownstone serves Spanish cuisine, this touch feels distinctly Chinese.

The tapas menu is vast, and ranges from simple delights; the traditional tortilla Española, or Spanish omelette; to the more advanced, with various seafood options and vegetable dishes also available. While some are excellent, such as the seared tuna and avocado, others including the chorizo are a bit underwhelming. Fortunately, tapas are best ordered to share, and you are more likely than not to receive a good selection if ordering a few varieties.

Brownstone features a number of other choices, including flatbreads, soups, salads and full entrees, although the latter is nothing that cannot be found at any higher-end

Western restaurant in Nanjing. Given the variety on offer, it is natural that prices also vary. Tapas are the cheapest option, ranging from ¥30 to ¥80 apiece, while full entrees can go for upwards of ¥200. Those wishing to get more yum for their yuan should look into going on a Monday, when all tapas are half price. Based on personal experience, this is a real bargain!



While the lounge's ambiance, food, and drink are mostly excellent, it should be noted that every inch of the space is used. So much so, in fact, that there is no bathroom within the premises, though there is one accessible through the neighbouring Zifeng mall. Yet, if this is the biggest shortcoming of what is ultimately a very enjoyable dining experience, it is a small price to pay.

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




Notes on using The Nanjinger Bus Table

This handy bus table is a cut down version of the entire Nanjing public bus system that focuses on parts of the city of interest to expats. If you are looking, for example, to travel from your home in Xianlin to Nanjing Railway station, look at the Xianlin area of the table (orange), then look to the right to see which lines run between the two locations. In this case number 97. Easy, huh?













Second Hand Property Transactions in China

■ The real estate market in the first tier cities of China remains red hot. While the Chinese government recently issued several new policies to control soaring house prices, even they cannot extinguish the fire that is the of passion to buy houses.

The fact is that house prices in China continue to soar. For those who cannot afford the price of a newly-built apartment, a second-hand alternative becomes their first choice. Compared to newly-built real estate, second-hand represents a much better cost-efficiency.

However, tumultuous second-hand house transactions sometimes cause trouble. Not every buyer can smoothly close the deal. Trade is always accompanied by risk while the amount of real estate business contract litigation continuously increases.

When you buy a second-hand house, you need to pay attention to the following points:

(i) Basic Situation of the House

Under normal conditions, a seller always has a housing mortgage, for different reasons. As a buyer, we should be very concerned about the basic situation of the house, especially that regarding the mortgage. Only unsecured houses are qualified for transfer in the Real Estate Trading Centre, which means the seller shall ensure to release all the mortgage(s).

(ii) Risk of Seizure by Court

All the contracts have been signed, the documents needed for Real Estate Trading Centre have been submitted, it seems everything is going well. You only need to wait for the Real Estate Trading Centre to finish the transfer within 15 days. Unfortunately, you are soon notified that the house you want to buy has been seized by the Court. How is this possible? Note that during the processing by the Real Estate Trading Centre, the house is still under the seller's name. The seller's creditors may apply to a Court to seize the seller's house at the a time when the property

is without a mortgage. If this happens, you do not have the house-ownership; what you have is only creditor's rights, meaning you can claim against the seller according to the house sale contract.

(iii) Seller Jumps Price

The sustained rise of real estate prices makes the seller break the contract which has signed with you. The seller refuses to perform the contract with excuses, such as not all of the owners signed, you did not complete the loan procedure or they just terminate the contract unilaterally.

How should you handle this situation? According to the Contract Law of the PRC, if the party that receives the deposit fails to perform the agreed obligations, it shall return twice the amount of the deposit. In order to reduce your losses, the best way is to stipulate a high deposit. If then, without reasonable ground, the seller breaks the contract, they shall face a significant penalty.

(iv) Preserve Evidence



Consider hiring a lawyer to handle all the negotiations and procedures to ease your burden and decrease the risks. Take faith that every important asset investment shall be treated discreetly in your best interests.
