“Shifu?” I ask, “shifu? Ting bu jian ma?” With no response, I peer over the front seat. “Ke’chink”, goes the lighter, blazing up another Nanjing Gold as he simultaneously gags up impressive fat greeny phlegm and spits it out of the window. After some intense coughing for a moment, he takes a toke of his smoke and a swig of tea from a jam jar, turns to me and says, “So, where you going?”

Finally hailing him down after what felt like hours, I was just pleased to be on my way. If it is even close to rush hour in Nanjing, one can forget it; regular taxis are as elusive as toilet paper. Didi Chuxin and Uber are the way to go these days, making life faster, hassle free and cheaper.

The evolution of transport in Nanjing over the nine years I have been coming here has happened amazingly fast when compared to how things move in my native Australia. Nine years ago, the trek from Xianlin to downtown meant a 45-minute, ¥100 car journey, while the snogs of 2008-2009 had the Xianlin folk quite literally stuck; there was no way to go downtown. Four years later, the metro came, and a couple of years after that I can take a Didi from downtown to Xianlin on the new highway in 30 minutes, for just ¥18. With the arrival of taxi hailing apps, these days I rarely take the bus or metro; why go through all the pushing and shoving, gawking and groping?

My phone rings. “Wei? Are you at your pick up point?” asks the softly spoken driver, “yes, I’m here, I’ll wait on the corner” I reply. “Ok, I’ll be there in a sec”. I scan the app for his car colour and number plate. As I look up he arrives, gliding down the road, all black, slick and shiny. I sit back and close my eyes until I arrive home. No messing about with money, I only have to get out and say goodbye to the driver.

This mode of transportation is nothing new; soccer mums from the Californian coast to the suburbs of Melbourne have been car-pooling for decades.

The development of cellular 4G, GPS systems and instant third party payment options paved the way for co-founders Travis Kalanick and Garrett Camp to launch Uber. The first time I took an Uber was in Leeds; it came to the door and dropped us at the pub for a third of the price a taxi would have cost. In Mexico, taxi drivers went on strike twice in the time I lived there, protesting the use of private cars. Uber is everywhere and its popularity is spreading like wildfire.

The public, the taxis and the government have welcomed Uber China and Didi Chuxin with open arms. Anything that helps relieve the strain on public transport is a help. However, I wonder whether Didi cars are adding to Nanjing’s horrific traffic problem. Possible.

As long as one books a private car for themselves, the cheaper option is obviously to car-pool with others. So if I am not in so much of a hurry I will choose this option, at times to my detriment. If people are not going to conduct themselves in an orderly manner when getting on the metro and off a bus, what makes you think they will in a car?

As the driver pulls up, he calls a passenger; there is already a man in the front seat, so I move over to let this other person in (a courtesy I rarely get in return). She dumps all of her shopping in the middle of the seat and squeezes her way in. As we pull away, she huffs and puffs while eyeing me up and eventually asks me to move over “just a bit more”. I look at her. “Like, are you kidding me? Where do you suppose I move to? There is no room!” She immediately gets her back up and starts ranting and raving that she has paid for two seats (one for her, one for her bags); in my defence, I start ranting and raving back until the driver eventually intervenes and breaks up our cat fight.

So etiquette problems have begun to surface in the Didi universe, some of which the drivers have to deal with. Who sits up front? Why do all the men get the front seat? Who is dropped off first? Where should people’s bags go? If I know a quicker way, is it rude to tell the driver? Wet umbrellas should stay on the floor.

London cabbies need to pass a test called The Knowledge before they can begin driving people

around. This is a very extensive examination that tests every part of the city; the drivers must know every lane, to every hotel, before they can drive. It is said that their brain even expands half an inch due to the test!

In China no such luck. The Knowledge is a part passenger, part driver cooperation, which sometimes ends badly.

GPS systems these days are pretty accurate at getting drivers where they need to go, which makes it possible for any yokel and his goat to download the app, rent a car and be on their way.

The leaves fall all around me, landing on my shoulders as autumn sets in and I stand on the corner of the road waiting for my Didi. My phone rings. “Wei?” I answer softly as it is 8:45am and my morning coffee hasn’t kicked in yet. “Wei! WHERE ARE YOU?!” the driver bellows down the phone. “I’m at the address it says, the address I put in.” “YEAH BUT I CAN’T READ! SO YOU NEED TO TELL ME WHERE YOU ARE!” the driver roars in a slightly panicky voice. This is not a good sign. I should have known.

After successfully leading him to my address, I get in the car and we are on our way; his car being slightly older and more unkempt than other Didi cars worries me but he seems jolly enough. I explain where I need to go and he seems sure of my destination, so I let my guard down. I open the BBC on my phone, sit back and settle into an article about Trump. That is, until the driver shouts, “CAN I USE THIS TUNNEL?”

I look up from my phone and recognise the tunnel, “Yes you can, but you need to bear left”, I said. “Hao de!” he said and pressed on. Forgetting he cannot read, I notice he is about to miss the left turn, “SHIFU! LEFT LEFT!!” I shout but to no avail, he has missed the turn and now we are on our way out to Pukou.

“WHAT? Oh no! I’ve missed the turn! Oh no, now we can’t turn around, oh no, miss...miss...miss, we’ve missed the turn... MISS, WE’VE MISSED THE TURN!” he cries. “YES Sherlock! I know! Now we are under the Yangtze river and on our

way to Pukou, you can’t turn around now; you have to just go straight and turn around when we get out”, I explain.

“PUKOU! AIYA! Why did you tell me we could take that tunnel?” Of course, it is the foreigner’s fault that we are now under the Yangtze River. He then spends the next half an hour it takes us to turn around to come back apologising after I scold him for blaming me. Having already returned my money to me via Wechat, after we exit the tunnel he says, “Ok, I think we are back, now where do we go?” He proceeded to get lost again in the Hexi suburbs having ignored my advice to just use his GPS.

Rumours are running wild with talk of Didi matching train prices and getting people to and from Shanghai and Nanjing, door to door. With technology rapidly improving such services, they are only going to become easier to use, cheaper and more accessible. It also gives ordinary people a way to run their own business successfully.

Shading ourselves from the rain, we wait for our Didi to pick us up from Shanghai Lu at midnight. It arrives five minutes after I book it. We get in (a little inebriated) and my partner whispers to me in English, “do you think they rent these cars? All the plastic is still on?” “I’m not sure” I reply softly. “Can you ask her?” he inquires of me, “I can’t remember how to say that in Chinese...” I tell him, defeated. “Yes, I rent this car”, says the driver in perfect English. Ah! Well that was embarrassing. “I’m an accountant by day and a Didi driver by night, it is obviously very profitable. That is why I do it”, said told us.

“Welcome to my car!” the driver pronounced. “Please put on your seat belt, sit back and relax. Any questions you have, just ask!” This particular professional even had a business card and asked me to not only give him five stars when I leave but to leave a comment too!

With as many as 16 million rides completed on Didi’s platform on a daily basis in 2016, its popularity is proving steadfast. As I look at my phone, I am astounded that I have built up 560 Didi points in seven months, points that allow me further ride discounts, spa treatments and discounts on flights! With my Didi booked and ready for tomorrow morning, it is one less thing I need to worry about. **NOX**

BREAKER ONE-NINER

We are spoilt rotten here in Nanjing and Jiangsu. Amongst everything else that makes us kings and queens of the big China castle is our road network. The highway asphalt that has been laid over the last decade all across the province is the envy of many a developed country. Driving a truck from Nanjing to Lianyungang would be a piece of cake.

On the other site of the country, however, can be found some of the most dangerous roads in the world. One such route, the G213, runs from Lanzhou, capital of Gansu province, to Mohan in Yunnan, a length of some 2,827 kilometres. Along the way, steep cliffs, landslides and parts where the road has been washed clean away.

The latter is the more frequent landscape/reality check for China's 16 million truck drivers, a life that is physically arduous to say the least. Many share a tiny cab with another man for 30 hour stretches, taking turns at driving, each enduring constant vibration while all along the truck bounces over potholes, and worse.

All this is also assuming nothing goes wrong.

The traffic jam that occurred on the G110 and G6 in Hebei and Inner Mongolia in August of 2010 could well be described as something going wrong.

The world's media called it the world's longest traffic jam ever.

The culprit? Truck drivers. Or to be more precise, truck drivers just doing their job and fulfilling a need. Feeding Beijing's endless appetite for coal, and with a lack in railway capacity, increased coal production in Inner Mongolia was transported to Beijing along the route that was already operating 60 percent over its designed capacity. Throw in road construction and maintenance that reduced capacity in places by 50 percent and the result was a traffic backlog lasting for 10 days.

During it all, drivers slept curled up in their truck seats, eating instant noodles and pocket-starch chicken sausages, sold to them at prices

a thousand times over the odds by zealous local people seizing the entrepreneurial opportunity. Had it been winter, they no doubt would have been charged an arm and a leg for warm water too.

Even under normal conditions, some journeys are so long they may require three drivers.

At the end of the day, it comes down to two factors; how urgent is delivery of the load, and how much is the operator willing to break the rules.

According to China's traffic regulations, a driver who works for four consecutive hours without a break of at least 20 minutes is considered to be officially drowsy. That, however, is of little concern in the bigger scheme of things. Sharing a truck means sharing the profit. Many simply choose to undertake the 16 hour drive alone, and uninterrupted.

Yet, this would be to paint a partially inaccurate picture of China's trucking landscape. As with the rest of the country, the industry is in a state of flux, with the participants often on the receiving end of a life that requires of them to be resilient, hard working and very patient.

The trucker also takes on more than his fair share of emotional toil. His journeys mean he spends more time away from his family than with them, and all the while surrounded by unfamiliar people in unfamiliar places. Some innovative drivers cheer themselves up by working in a groups of friends and taking their families with them; whole communities on the road to deliver essentials for the First World.

Back to us and our castle. Or to be precise, to the pile of parcels on the drawbridge outside the castle gates that have been delivered for employees over the course of the day. How do you think they got there? Sure, there was the "last mile" guy, but prior to him taking over, how did the parcels get to your local distribution centre?

By truck of course.

It is precisely this revolution in online shopping that is simultaneously bolstering and threatening the trucking industry.

The bulk of these small-medium sized truck drivers are affiliated to a logistics company, one that may or may not require them to have their truck decorated in the firm's colours.

For, like it or not, these little operations are in fierce competition with the container trucking companies for the lucrative deliveries from factory or warehouse to port. Yet, the size and efficiency of the latter forces the former to radically slash its rates.

Some are too tempted by the seeming invincibility of the bigger firms, with their ties to international shipping lines. In such cases, fancy new trucks, owned by the ports themselves, are linked by computer to the port's warehousing and logistics system. The drivers then know exactly where their load should be delivered so that gantry cranes can load the container into its designated slot on the ship.

Yet, there remains trouble in paradise. The drivers chosen for the task are invariably migrant workers recruited from far away by labour agencies.

The port sets up dormitory accommodation and buses them to and from the docks in purpose built vehicles with an almost clandestine manner.

The Ningbo Port Authority has previously reported that such firms employ temporary migrant workers on account there are many duties that need performing in addition to the actual driving, and that these are often both dirty and dangerous. Thus there is a need for a large pool of workers who are both strong physically and able to endure hardship. They also happen to be much cheaper to employ.

Danger, however, remains the watchword. Zhang Yaofeng is one of the millions who drives the perilous trucking routes of China on a regular basis. Previously, like many, a farmer

and a coal miner, he got started in the industry after seeing relatives become rich upon choosing to go down the truck driver road. Following in their footsteps, he is now three trucks down, debt free after paying off the loans to buy said trucks and has built a new house with a courtyard in his village.

Transporting raw materials and parts for Foxconn, the Apple and Samsung supplier, Zhang told Southern People Weekly Magazine,

“[The job of a truck driver] is both tedious and dangerous, but without it what else can I do?”

While he seems to have done pretty nicely, Zhang's summation hits the nail on the head. Yet, there may now be some light at the end of the tunnel. For just as with other sectors, technological advances combined with lenient regulations could bring robotic assistance to drivers such as Zhang sooner than we think. The very same environment that has given birth to the explosion in contactless payments and the realities of drone delivery (in our very own Jiangsu) shall also bring us driverless trucks. Or at least, automation technologies that will reduce cost and accidents, improve overall efficiency for the industry and let men such as Zhang make longer, more profitable journeys that are safer, by way of the technology affording him the prerequisite breaks.

Putting a computer in the driving seat, at least for some of the way, is potentially very big business. With the trucking industry in China worth in the region of ¥2 trillion annually, and driver costs accounting for approximately 40 percent of those incurred, it is little wonder there is great interest in the field, with a number of significant players in the market already emerging.

China's Internet search giant, Baidu, has teamed up with truck maker Foton with an emphasis on automated driving and other areas of artificial intelligence. The two have even gone so far as to show off a self driving truck at an event held just last month at the Shanghai New International Expo Centre.

Elsewhere, TuSimple is a technology company devoted to the development and application of artificial intelligence and computer vision. In co-operation with a large Chinese truck maker (the company declined to say which one), the firm is collecting data aboard a number of manually driven trucks; relying heavily on computer vision and algorithms, its technology can understand a scene in detail, presumably one day becoming able to safely drive a truck through it. **It is certainly impressive stuff; TuSimple's website includes a fun vehicle recognition feature whereby, in The Nanjinger's test, the technology had no trouble at all in recognising a major European manufacturer's emerging markets model, with someone standing in front of it in the picture, and a 2001 Honda Accord.** Not bad.

Speaking with the website TechnologyReview.com, the San Diego and Beijing based firm's Chief Technology Officer, Hou Xiaodi, who developed Spectral Saliency Theory, one of the decade's most influential works in the field of visual attention, said of their technology, "Everything is done in computer vision with deep learning", in reference to training data that is fed into a large neural network.

Whether the future features robotic companions for truckers or not, that the Chinese government is investing heavily in improving both infrastructure and regulation to facilitate freight transport, shall, in theory, considerably improve the lot of those working on the front lines of the industry.

Just as well. China's truckers are going to need all the help they can get, in navigating their way past not only the pot holes and traffic jams, but also those unwittingly making their lives all the more difficult. The next time we open our Tao-bao delivery, spare them a thought. 🇨🇳



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Itchy Itchy, Scratchy Scratchy

- One of the most frequent reasons owners bring their pets to the veterinarian is skin problems. There are literally hundreds of skin diseases that can affect our pets. Not all of them are itchy.

Also known as pruritus, itch is a sensation that causes a desire to scratch. There are many similarities to pain; both are unpleasant but the behavioural response is very different. While pain elicits a withdrawal reflex, itching leads to a scratch reflex.

Skin Parasites

- (i) Fleas are tiny wingless insects that feed on mammals. Flea-bites will make some dogs and cats so miserable that they will bite and scratch themselves raw (Flea allergic dermatitis). Others may not respond to flea-bites with the same intensity.
- (ii) Ticks are blood sucking mites that usually attach themselves to the host for long periods, providing opportunity for an exchange of infection. They are at the same time very resilient and can survive for up to 3 years without a blood meal.
- (iii) Mites are responsible for the skin disease known as mange or scabies. In dogs this is caused by the *Sarcoptes scabiei* mite, a highly contagious skin parasite. Mites will burrow into the skin and cause severe itching, which can result in the formation of scabs and hair loss.

Allergies

While in humans, allergies (an exaggerated reaction of the immune system) are manifest typically as runny eyes/nose and perhaps sneezing, in our pets, allergies mostly present themselves as skin conditions. Animals can build an allergic reaction to a myriad of allergens, with the most common being environmental in nature, such as different types of grass, some trees, house dust mites, etc.

Pollens can also cause allergies, but usually on a seasonal basis, while other major impetuses for skin allergies in our pets can be the various ingredients in their meals. Referred to as Food allergy, it can develop at any time in their life,

even if they have been eating the same food all along. Besides itchiness, food allergic dogs often develop ear or skin infections, while cats tend to advance a crusty dermatitis and sometimes hair loss.

Once an allergen is identified through blood or skin test (superior method), the allergic pet can receive allergy hyposensitisation injections that will help in 70-75 percent of cases.

There is no reliable test for Food allergy; its diagnosis is time consuming (up to 10 weeks) and a dedicated veterinarian and owner is essential. An elimination diet shall be prescribed, ideally a very simple one with ingredients to which the pet has never been previously exposed. If there is improvement after 8-10 weeks, a challenge diet is introduced; similar to the diet before the trial. Recurrence of symptoms is affirmative of food allergy.

Infection

Although the main reason for a pet's itchy skin may be allergies or parasites, they often acquire secondary bacterial or yeast infections which can keep the itch going even if the underlying cause is treated. Such infections can cause red, crusty and flaky skin, hair loss, pimples and red bumps. In addition, yeast infections can cause skin to look thickened. Skin infections should be treated with a 2-6 week course of appropriate oral antibiotics or antiyeast medication.

With many new treatments developed in recent years, such as antiparasitic dips, ivermectin or fipronil, pet owners now have the resources at hand to ensure their companions do not go through life incessantly licking, itching and/or scratching. **NV**

Broken Umbrellas & Stir Fried Squid

■ During the 1950s and 60s a number of mainlanders crossed the border into Hong Kong in search of employment, although jobs at the time were hard to come by. Shopkeepers provided their employees with food and lodging and if employees got the sack, they had to roll up their bedding and tie it neatly before leaving. The shape of the rolled up quilt with its crisscross sewn pattern looked to the Chinese something like stir-fried squid, which is scored with a grid pattern so it coils attractively once cooked. Chao yauyu, literally “stir-fried squid” in Cantonese, then came to be used as an expression meaning “to be fired” and is still used colloquially in Hong Kong and Mainland China today.

It is these nuggets of history and culture captured in only a few words that add colour to Cantonese as well as Mandarin, and indeed all languages. They are usually learnt from speaking with locals rather than in textbooks, but this particular one I learnt of from an artwork.

In February 2014, Hong Kong designer and illustrator Ah To produced a cartoon titled *The Great Canton and Hong Kong Proverbs* which celebrates the richness of Cantonese language by depicting over eighty proverbs in one colourful and lively scene. The artist directly modelled his work on a painting by Pieter Bruegel the Elder from 1559 called *Netherlandish Proverbs* which also visually represents over a hundred Netherlandish proverbs and idioms.

There are a wealth of stories in Ah To's eye catching cartoon from the curious to the conventional. Talking for hours on the phone is coined “boiling telephone congee” while “dragging a cow up a tree” is an attempt in vain. Don't try and “catch crabs up a hill” either because that is completely impossible, or “draw an ear on the wall” because no one will listen to you. And avoid being fooled by the “big frog hopping around the street”; it's just too good to be true.


Besides a celebration of language, Ah To's cartoon speaks on another level. It was created in response to an earlier

article on the Hong Kong Education Bureau website where Cantonese was described as a dialect and “not an official language” of Hong Kong. The definition sparked outrage among locals with growing concerns about the increasing influence and superiority of Mandarin over Cantonese in education. Rather than rant on social media, Ah To's creative response is witty and effective, putting a positive spin on the debate, promoting local culture and emphasising the diversity of idioms in Cantonese.

Language is but one thing that sets Hong Kong apart from much of the Mainland as Hong Kong today grapples with an ever changing and increasingly murky definition of “one country, two systems”, a policy promised upon the return of the former British colony to China in 1997. Its unique history in past centuries distinguishes it from the Mainland in so many ways, making the people of Hong Kong proud of their identity, their freedoms and their distinct culture.

As we have seen throughout China, the spread and sometimes enforcement of standard Chinese, or Putonghua, is a tool for the Chinese government to keep people under their wing, but in many cases it has also served to dumb down cultural diversity creating a threat to regional dialects and languages of which China has so many.

Cantonese will not die out. To the people of Hong Kong, it is the native language, not Mandarin, as well as an integral part of their identity. So too is freedom of speech, democracy and a respect of Hong Kong's culture.

Artists such as Ah To show the passion and determination that exists among Hong Kong people to preserve that identity. Yet another proverb in his cartoon shows an umbrella with a broken handle meaning “to fight to the bitter end”, which in fact existed before the Umbrella Movement of 2014. It acts as a poignant metaphor for the people of Hong Kong who demonstrated for months despite heavy rain to fight for what that in which they believe. 

GENERATION **OPINION** THE **NANJING** MASSACRE

79 years ago, the Japanese invaded Nanjing, or as it is was known back then; Nanking. Over a period of six weeks, starting when the invaders captured Nanjing on 13 December, the Japanese slaughtered the Chinese, most doing it as if it were a game to them.

These are the basics of the Nanjing Massacre, the “textbook stuff”. For most young Chinese men and women these days, this is all they were taught. Some do not even know this much, or about how their city came to be the thriving and beautiful metropolis that it is.

You would think that growing up, or living, in the wonderful city of Nanjing, people would take time to learn about its culture. You might even imagine that an event such as this, the Nanjing Massacre, would be taught to children in depth, over and over again, in school. In reality, the exact opposite appears to be the case. For this piece, I interviewed seven men and women, five of whom in their 20s, and two in their late 40s, on what they know about the Nanjing Massacre and how they feel about it. I received a variety of answers, most of which shocked me.

The first group I came across was a group of friends made up of three 20-year-old women. When I asked Ms. Xia how much she knew about the events of the massacre and where she had learnt such, she told me that she did not know very much; only “the information in high school text books, and went to the Nanjing massacre museum”. Ms. Gu told me that she felt “quite unhappy about it”. When I questioned Ms. Shi about whether she wanted to know more, she replied with a firm yes. Yet, it seemed as if the three of them were relying on each other in their answers.

22 year old Mr. Li, on the other hand, came across as disinterested and less than enthusiastic about the subject. He told me that he could not remember most of what he had been taught. When probed whether or not he wanted to know more on the issue, he replied with a dismissive, “Ok”.

I then met Mr. Wang, 27, who was very friendly, easy to approach and held many detailed opinions. On the way we face this event, he said, “[We should] respect history.


Some people are very emotional about this thing, and think badly about Japan and the Japanese. But we still have to face it calmly”.

I then interviewed Mr. Yan and Mrs. Chen, both 47, living in Xianlin and with a daughter who goes to Nanjing International School. Mr. Yan told me that the Nanjing Massacre is definitely still relevant in today’s society as, according to him, the Japanese “don’t admit the truth... China thinks that 300 thousand people died, but Japan says that 160 thousand did”.

Mrs. Chen held a similar opinion; “I have been learning about this since I was very young. I also know that the Japanese government does not admit this, and I think they are scared to face their savage actions”. Mrs. Chen feels very strongly about the matter, believing all children should grow up learning the truth; what she calls, “both sides of the story”.

The difference in attitude between everyone is obvious. While some younger Chinese may not be bothered about their lack of knowledge over a savage part of history that occurred on their doorstep, there are others who feel more strongly, for example Mr. Wang, Mr. Yan and Mrs. Chen. They are all of the opinion that the younger people of today do not know enough about the period, and should learn more.

This generation may not want to gain an understanding of the Nanjing Massacre, but neither should they develop a hatred for the Japanese. Perhaps, as Mr. Yan was taught, they should learn to forgive, but remember. It is only by remembering that we can prevent these horrific events from ever happening again.

Of the seven people to whom I spoke, Mr. Wang was the one to best hit the nail on the head; not to act out of hate, and not necessarily to forgive and forget, but to face things head on, yet with a calm demeanour.

CAN THEY FIGURE YOU OUT IN 4 MINUTES?

- You walk through the door 5 minutes before the meeting starts. You smile around, silently acknowledging the people in the room. You take a seat near the middle of the table. Someone offers you something to drink. You ask for coffee; espresso if possible. You take out your portable computer; swiftly look at your phone, turn it off and start to talk with the people nearest to you.

In a few minutes, your new colleagues, clients or business partners will have acquired first impressions that influence your relationship.

You walk into a restaurant, smile at the waiter and ask politely for a table for two. You follow him, looking straight with your chin pointing up, walking fast with long steps. You sit without crossing your legs and ask for water; pull out your phone, swiftly look at it, turn it to silent and sit straight, waiting the other guest.

In a few seconds, people around you will have acquired first impressions that influence how you will be looked at, served and perhaps remembered.

Do you know how you impress people around you? We often do not. Yet, those impressions can last a long time, and will probably be reinforced at every future encounter, because this is simply your way.

In addition to speech, writing and facial expressions, people communicate in other ways that are often less self-conscious. An instinctive part of our brain sizes people up for status, liability, friendliness, threat... for whatever you want to call it; culture, instinct, prejudice... Such first impressions are practically impossible to eradicate; it may be possible to change them but it will be a long and tireless path.

Psychologists and sociologists studying people interactions support such intuitions with evidence. Often we are unaware of how we trigger them with our behaviour.

Let us walk through those first minutes again, this time looking out for clues.


Arriving 5 minutes early made punctual and efficient people feel at ease and respected. Some did not care, including those who arrived late. Confidently smiling around in a silent way impressed outgoing people. Walking to the middle of the table spoke to people of your non-arrogance, while others might have seen it as a lack of leadership. Your choice of espresso speaks loud about you, and people interpreted it depending on their own habits and nationality.

Most of us do (or don't do) these things with little attention. The ways you meet, greet, walk, speak, sit, dress, eat; use mobiles, emails, social media; and your very tone of voice can all become your strengths.

Learn to use simple actions as better interactions.

Observing yourself will give you great clues as to the status you bring into a room or an encounter. Asking for an espresso in Europe is a neutral sign if you are a Caucasian. It is a good sign of appreciation if you are a visiting Asian. Walking fast and with your chin up will be appreciated by assertive people, but not the introverted.

Minor adjustments to our habits can help us leave the first impressions that we want to leave.

Being mindful about this first impression can and will help also in our interactions with people from different cultures and backgrounds.

Stir It Up by Ella Fisher

FEEL THE BURN!

■ At this time of year, I crave food that will warm me up. Naturally, I want lots and lots of chilli, so it is lucky I live in a country that will provide me with such dishes whenever I want. Chillies come in all different shapes and sizes but I want to draw your attention to my favourite that I have discovered here; the Sichuan long dried chilli. What's so great about this type of chilli is the heat you get from it, as drying chillis intensifies their natural fiery flavour. When I see them in any dish, I know it is going to provide me with the mouth burning, nose running, eye watering heat I have grown to love. As a result, to pick a dish to cook this month was very easy; stir fried beef with spring onions, peppers and of course chilli. Here is the recipe I used:

- 1 packet of really thinly sliced beef
- 1 tbsp shaoxing rice wine vinegar
- 1 tbsp soy sauce
- 5 cloves of garlic (finely chopped)
- Ginger (a thumb sized piece cut into slices)
- 8 Sichuan dried chillies (use more or less depending on how spicy you like it!)
- 1 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp sugar
- 4 spring onions (both the white and green bits chopped)
- 1 pepper (cut lengthways, thinly sliced)
- 1 tbsp oil

The chillies are a doddle to find in any supermarket if you know what you are looking for. They should be long, thin and shrivelled with a dark red colour. They come in packets or loose from a local fruit and veg market. You can buy the thinly sliced beef in most Chinese supermarkets. It is in the freezers in clear containers with the beef rolled up. I went for the brand that had a cow on the front so I knew I was buying beef! This was a bit pricey at around ¥40, so make sure you are buying the right meat.

First, defrost the beef. Get the oil in the wok and wait until it is hot. Add the garlic, chilli, cumin and ginger to the pan and cook for around 5 minutes until you can smell the aromatic spices. Watch the pan constantly and always keep the ingredients moving.

Next, add the white parts of the spring onions, peppers and the beef and cook for a further 2-3 minutes and keep stirring to make sure nothing burns in the pan!

Add the green part of the spring onions, soy sauce, sugar and vinegar. Cook until it coats the beef and the liquid has almost evaporated from the wok.

Tip onto a plate and serve while still sizzling!

This dish from prep to plate took around 15 minutes and was extremely simple to cook. It is pretty much throwing ingredients into a pan in a certain order to produce a knock out dish that serves around 4 people. One word of caution; for any of you whose mind has a tendency to wander off along other trains of thought while cooking (my mind a prime example of this!), please try to focus your attention on the cooking at hand!

This is a very speedy dish to cook which requires constant watching and stirring of ingredients. I managed to burn both the beef, the garlic and chillies on several occasions which made my flat smell disgusting and the dish taste, well, burnt! Make sure to also follow the order of cooking above. If you add the liquids first, they cook out too quickly, leaving an overly sour and salty taste in your mouth. Aside from that, I found this dish extremely tasty while also delivering the fiery kick I want in these cold winter months. During my research I discovered that some believe chillis to be highly addictive; why don't you try this recipe and find out if these rumours are true? **NUT**

Gaiwan God Shot

Lovers of stove-top espresso talk about “the god shot”, an event that comes around even less often than Christmas, but one which leaves an indelible impression when it does.

Brewing an espresso is a temperamental business. You can always get a drinkable espresso shot from an aluminium pot. But even after “tamping” the grounds into perfect submission, pouring in the exact quantity of water, lighting the stove, and listening for the moment just before the whistle, when the heat and pressure have elicited the bubbly oil; the result is never guaranteed. Usually, it is either slightly burnt or slightly gree; always appreciated, but not always godly.

With tea, we are slightly luckier. For one thing, tea is usually not a one-shot experience. With green tea in a tall glass (as with a caffè latte), there are plenty of mouthfuls to be had. Even after that, good tea offers further infusions.

But with leaves there is the real risk of “stewing”, leaving them for too long in the same water; or scalding, exposing them to a heat from which they never recover. On the other hand, under-infused tea is an unsettling statement of absence, an experience inferior to water.

Extracting the best from tea requires the close monitoring of three independent variables:

- ◆ Leaf : water ratio
- ◆ Water temperature
- ◆ Steeping time

I liken it to photography and to the discipline of exposing the image to privilege the most desirable

details. The equivalent variables (in the same order) are aperture, film speed and shutter speed.


The best way to monitor these variables is with repeated, short infusions in a small vessel; a gaiwan, for example, as heavily plugged last month. With this Chinese invention, it is possible to skirt around some of the off-tastes of a green tea, to still find a warm, mouth-filling umami experience in there. It is perfect for extracting the last charms from a fruity oolong.

Big teapots, by contrast, are stewing devices; they are blunt instruments. Likewise, tall glasses can work fine. But, just like the rugby club Christmas party, they require you to drink at a certain pace.

The other beneficiary of miniaturisation is the tea cup. No bigger than the base of a chess-piece, these translucent cups are a joy to manipulate. Sipping from their small opening involves a degree of sucking; stirring air and aroma through the mouth and nose. Each cup is truly a shot-like experience.

One of the lessons learned from the New Coke fiasco in the ‘80s (where the focus groups preferred the “New Coke” product but the buying public found it sickly) is that sipping a liquor can give a very different impression from gulping down huge quantities of it.

The Chinese tea method helps channel flavour. It offers flexibility in pacing, precision control, muscle-memory comfort and no small sense of theatre.

So go on. Forget about buying your loved ones scarves and socks this Christmas. Uncheck that espresso maker from your Taobao trolley; buy them all a gongfu tea set instead.

The Cocktail Bar with the Incense

- When it comes to choosing a spot for dinner with friends, the conversation usually goes something like, “Do you fancy going to the soup place, or tudou ni-urou? Or how about dumplings; cheap dumplings, or greasy dumplings? No? What about ‘beautiful bacteria?’” Not one of us could tell you the actual name of any of these places; it simply makes more sense to refer to them by what makes them memorable. And Don Quixote has just joined the club. I now christen it “the cocktail bar with the incense”.

Smell is definitely an underrated sense. We do not cook or mix drinks simply to smell them, but we certainly do not complain about the wonderful bi-product. At Don Quixote, however, it was smell that left a lasting impression. It took pride of place in my cocktail, so much so that two people had to deliver it. One to turn over an upturned glass accumulating

wisps of incense, another to theatrically pour over a clear blond liquid, laden with tequila and whisky.

The first waft and sip, and I’m happy as Larry.

The Men’s Talk cocktail is a sobering ¥120, but with 30 percent alcohol content, it does well to soften the senses, packed with ingredients of which I only wish I knew. Carpano Antica Formula? I’m sold! I ordered mine pre-Trump, but I would say now it makes for an even more appropriate tipple.

Men’s Talk is barman Jacko Chang’s champion concoction. It sits next to other winners on the menu alongside a concise selection of seasonal cocktails, Don Quixote signatures and vintage classics, such as Pimm’s. If you’ve come for a Tequila Sunrise, this isn’t really your place.

For Jacko is a world class cocktail champion from Taiwan, one brought in to give Don Quixote some fresh blood and a makeover. As part of the Lee Cartel that also includes Tap Planet, The Loft and PCP, it was felt the time was right for a change.

At one side of this cosy haunt, Jacko cooks up the weird and wonderful from a menagerie of spirits. He uses Oolong Vodka and Maraschino (an Italian cherry liqueur), Midori (a Japanese melon liqueur) and Cynar (an artichoke-based bittersweet liqueur). Then there's Ketel 1, Talisker 10, Zacapa 23 Infusion Earl Grey Tea, Orange Blossom Water and even Sod Water (although I'm pretty sure that last one was a typo). You may need Google. But I suggest instead you pick a cocktail, slide further into that armchair and trust that what you get will be excellent.

Pretentious? Well, yes. Worth it? Absolutely. The curious combination of incense and whisky was enough to impress me, but Jacko's got plenty more up his sleeve. Each cocktail comes with a good measure of imagination and artistry, and the flair of a professional. So next time you're looking for somewhere to go, think of that cocktail bar with the incense and head to Don Quixote.

Where East Asia Meets West Africa

- There has always been a push in the expat cuisine scene for restaurants to market their food as authentic. Of course, this type of marketing all too often leads to disappointment.



Occasionally, however, it leads to unexpected delights. Such is the case with Calabash, a new, and very authentic, West African restaurant on Shanghai Lu.



Calabash is the brainchild of two Ghanaian expats, serving up home-cooked meals quite unlike anything else in Nanjing. The idea for Calabash first came about when Paa, one of the founders, was a student in Nanjing. His cooking, based on family recipes from Ghana, attracted fans at the university, and soon enough this side business developed into a delivery service. Now, Paa's gourmet meals finally have a home in a full-blown restaurant.


The secret here is in the spices, some imported directly from Ghana, which do much to elevate the various dishes. Familiar items such as grilled chicken and rice take on bold new flavours, while more unique options, like cassava and plantain, are mouth-watering in their own right.

The tongue-tingling tastes on offer are spicy, though they never quite venture into "hot" territory. Still,

those with spice-averse stomachs may wish to go for a more mild alternative on the menu, such as a sandwich or salad.

The staff are exceptionally friendly, and the environment is well-utilised. The upstairs is a relaxed lounge area, while the first floor has a more adventurous vibe, complete with jungle ceiling! Movie nights, music, and a bar with an excellent cocktail menu are all featured on the main floor. One caveat; Calabash is only open in the evenings and for brunch on weekends, so do not stop by looking for lunch.

Despite all this excitement, there is a quiet charm to Calabash that is very relaxing and enjoyable. It is never easy to get a taste of home in Nanjing, but the next best thing is finding a place where others share an authentic taste of theirs.



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

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Are the Chinese Driving New Energy Vehicles?

■ China is seeing more new energy vehicles on the roads, from high-end luxury electric cars such as Tesla to local offerings from the likes of BYD, ROEWE and BAIC/BJEV. At the 14th China (Guangzhou) International Automobile Exhibition, there were a total of 1,130 cars on display, of which 146 were new energy vehicles; 49 domestic and 97 foreign. According to the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers, from January to October 2016, the output of new energy vehicles was 355,000. In October alone, they numbered 49,000.

The lure of such numbers, however, has resulted in a bout of misappropriation. The Ministry of Finance has so far punished five automakers for violating a program that subsidises part of the production of new energy vehicles; the most serious being Suzhou's Gemsea. At the beginning of 2015, Gemsea applied for the subsidy but by the end of the year, registrations had already been made on a number of cars for which manufacturing had not even begun. The government has since recovered the money and slapped the company with an additional ¥259 million fine.

The Rise of New Energy Vehicles in China

While license plate restrictions on traditional vehicles in certain cities are pushing consumers to buy new energy cars which are not subjected thereto, and petrol in China is relatively expensive, government subsidised manufacturers are also making new energy vehicles more affordable.

There follows some of the policy highlights that support the development of new energy vehicles.

On 17 June, 2009 the Ministry of Industry and Information Technology (MIIT) formulated the Management Rules on Access to New Energy Vehicles Production Enterprises and Products, in order to promote the progress of automotive product technology.

On 14 July, 2014 the General Office of the State Council issued the Guidance on Speeding up Promotion and Application of New Energy Vehicles.


On 1 August, 2014 the Ministry of Finance (MF), the State Administration of Taxation (SAT) and the MIIT jointly issued the Announcement on Exemption of Vehicle Purchase Tax on New Energy Vehicles.

On 22 April, 2016 the MF, MST, MIIT and NDRC jointly issued the Notice on Promotion and Application of New Energy Vehicles from Year 2016 to 2020. The four Ministries and Commissions will continue to implement the policy of subsidy by giving grants for the purchase of new energy vehicles on a general preferential basis.

On 7 May, 2016 the MF, SAT and MIIT jointly issued the Notice of Vehicle and Vessel Tax Preferential Policies for Vehicles and Vessels Using New Energy in Order to Save Energy, in which tax for vehicles and vessels using new energy will be exempted.


In accordance with the Notice on Promotion and Application of New Energy Vehicles from Year 2016 to 2020 (except for fuel cell powered vehicles), subsidies shall eventually be cut. Between 2017 and 2018 subsidies shall decrease by 20 percent while between 2019 and 2020 they will decrease by 40 percent.

New Energy Vehicles will have a Bright Future in China

With subsidy policies to be phased out, only market-oriented automakers and suppliers, which devote themselves to technology research and development, product quality, reliability and consumer satisfaction, shall be able grasp opportunities for concession. With a tight hold on manufacturing grants, China is sure to soon see a surge in reliable, affordable eco cars on the road.


