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

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"Just as a formality Mrs. Lin, we will need something on record that can prove your family history. Is there anything we can use?" asked the British woman sat behind the desk at the Visa Application Centre in Shanghai.

"What about testimonies from family or friends?" Mrs. Lin's husband inquired. He is British. She is Chinese. They are recently married and wish to return to the small rainy island in the hopes of starting a family.

"Anything that can prove the validity of the information you have given, and I recommend you provide as much as you can to make the process as smooth as possible," she advised. "It's ok, I have a box of diaries I have kept over the years; the information they contain in addition to the testimonies should be enough", said Mrs. Lin, her thoughts suddenly out of the office and away in her past.

Back in Lianyungang Jiangsu province, Xiao Lin (29) found the box. Keen to hear her stories about her illusive past, her husband listens intently as she opens the pages...

Diwy 1. 1987 - 1997 Lianyungang, Jiangsu

"My family already had two daughters before giving birth to my twin sister and me; they expected to have a boy, another failure. So my grandmother suggested giving my twin sister and me away to another family. I heard that my twin sister and me spent sometime with this new family, but for some reason my family took us back.

"My earliest memory would be in my grand parents' kitchen seeing my youngest sister in the cradle. She was the last try for my parents to have a boy before my dad was forced to get a vasectomy.

"My family had some dogs and cats but not as a pet. More like guard dogs. But they would usually be poisoned after they grew a little bigger.

"My sisters and I always helped my parents to do the rice harvest. So we helped to cut the rice down, carry it to the tractor and separate the wheatears from the plant. All of this process was done by hand. "[As a child my favourite game to play] was Chinese rubber band skipping. This was a very popular game among all girls at that time. We [had] never heard of computer games. Electricity only started to become popular when I was around six. After a few years TV started to come into some family's homes. Throughout the whole village only one family had a TV, so all the neighbours would go to this family to watch TV shows.

"My family always called me 'Da Shuang', which means the first twin and my twin sister as the second twin was 'Er Shuang'. When my twin sister and I were nine years old, my mum sent us to kindergarten. Both of us didn't have a proper name and the teacher asked my mum what our names were; my mum said she didn't know. Then the teacher asked if we had any nicknames and my mum said 'Da Shuang', 'Er Shuang', so the teacher added our family name into them. We went around for a few weeks using these awkward names before our mum gave us proper names."

Diary 2. The Village

"In my village women didn't usually have a proper job; they just spent their time farming, so

when its winter women usually spent time at home visiting their neighbours; a group of women sitting together and chatting [is how they would spend their time]. My mum would usually have us with her. Most of these women never went to school, so their only source of information was from talking to one another. One of their topics they loved talking about always scared me; ghosts.

"This woman was grabbed by a hand under the bed, that woman saw a ghost in a field. People were very scared of ghosts, even men. If a child was born lacking an arm, this child will be thought of as a ghost and he will be hung up on a willow tree, which supposedly can kill the ahost within.

"One of our neighbour's daughters went swimming one day and accidently drowned. Her body was put on top of the house roof to dry in case she became a water ghost.

"[There was this] guy from the one child policy office, he was a very fat guy and very violent. The whole village was scared of him. In the early 90s the party took the one child policy very seriously, so in order to make people listen to them they would usually choose some very violent thugs who could handle people's protests to go in and deal with the people.

"[At the time] this guy was the leader of the office. If the government found a family had given birth to another baby, this family was fined a certain amount of money and this fat guy with his group would come over to said family's home; if the family didn't give any money they would use violence and then take all of the valuable stuff from that family. I remember my family used to hide all of our family's valuables somewhere like wooden beds, bags of rice etc... and usually when these guys came to the village, our neighbour would shout out to let us know they were comina."

Diary 3. Grandpa

"A soldier killed my great grandfather because he refused to join the army during the war. My father's side never mentioned this to us because it's a [terrible] shame for

the whole family. All this I heard from my neighbours.

"So, because of my great grandfather's early death and his refusal to join the party; when my grandfather was near the age to find a girl to marry it was very difficult for him. So because of his very bad family background, as a result my grandfather ended up marrying his cousin who is my grandmother now.

"My mum [was the most influential person to me as a child], my family lives in a small village and the whole village comes from one family. So our neighbours are actually our relatives as well. All of the women in each family are very proud to give a boy to continue [the] family name. But my mum was the only woman who failed to give a boy. Especially because my dad was grand-dad's eldest son, so the whole village looked down on my parents.

"Whenever my mum argued with my neighbour, the neighbour would say some very cruel words to my mum, like you are not a woman, you cannot even give birth to a boy. Even one of my uncle's wives teased my mum because she was the woman [who wasn't able] to give my grandpa a grandson. My mum cried a lot about that. She felt very sorry.

"I never understood why, but now I know. There was [a lot of] pressure for a woman to give birth to a boy. The boy can carry the family name on, and a girl is like the Chinese phrase; a daughter is like the water poured out from the pot, meaning girls are useless."

Diary 4. School

"In middle school my best friend was a little bit chubby but very kindhearted. He came from a wealthier family. I remember sometimes he would buy me some snacks because he knew that I didn't have any money to buy them.


"One of my teachers in high school once said, all of you girls should take care of your body now, because when all of you become a wife you will give birth and giving birth is very painful. Then he started to talk a little about how to take care of

yourself as a woman.

"What he said impressed me a lot. Up until this point in my life I never knew men could care about women. Because throughout my childhood, every family only wanted a boy, they never cared about girls. Nobody liked girls. My dad never really showed his love to us. I always think we are his shame.

"In school I was a very hardworking student. I never caused any trouble to my teachers, in my classmate's words; I was quite nerdy. My parents never put high hopes on me but I knew they wanted me to get into university and become the family's honour.

"My dad used to be a carpenter. So he can draw and paint. Sometimes he would work at home. I would watch him draw. I began to like drawing as well: even now I paint Chinese traditional art.

"I attended a university in Nanjing. My twin sister and I used to be in the same grade but then in high school I left school for one year due to depression, I really hated high school.

"Pressure from my parents [drove me to attend university]. My family was looked upon my attending university as a great accomplishment."

Diary 5. Family

ferently. I think my mum wasn't a successful mum. She never taught her children to be confident. Instead she made us think that as a girl, we are her shame. She had a very bad temper when we were young, so this affected my twin sister and I a lot later on, especially my twin sister who ended up becoming bipolar. And my dad never really spent too much time with us. He was always quiet.

"I wish I had been raised dif-

"As a parent I will teach my child to be confident and be sociable.

"The word family means my husband and I love

each other and we love the children no matter if it's a boy or a girl. I don't mind how much money we have, happiness is what's important.

"The greatest hardship my family has had to bear has been a constant lack of money. My dad tried a lot of ways to earn more money. In the early days he went to Nanjing to sell some plastic bowls, he grew mushrooms, worked in a furniture shop. But it wasn't until he started to work in a big factory in a city that he started to earn more money. That's when my family started to live a better life

"Modesty is the best gift my parents have given me. Both my mum and my dad have very mild personalities. They have never been rude to anyone. I saw all of our neighbours be arrogant and act superior to others, but my parents always showed their respect to everyone.

"As time goes on all of my sisters have got married so my parents have less of a family burden, so they are happy now.

"I have five sisters but one was given away to my auntie. She was the second last one; because my parents still wanted to try for a boy my nan suggested they give her to the bigger daughter. When she was around 10 years old her family sent her back because my auntie didn't want her registered under their family name; she technically is still ours. She struggledto get along with us, my sisters didn't like her that much and we argued quite a lot, so she went back to my aunties again.

"We were very poor. When all of the children went to school, this became a very big problem as my parents had to pay the tuition fees for each of the kids every year. That was a lot of money for them. My twin sister and me started school really late compared to the other kids.

"Each year, we only got to eat some meat and fish during spring festival, we never had new clothes, relatives would give their old clothes to our family and younger ones would always wear the elder ones hand me downs.

"My father is the one I admire the most. Without having a son, I think my dad was sadder than

my mum, especially when he was forced to have a vasectomy. He never spoke of his sadness, but when I grew up I was able to imagine how he felt at the time. I really saw him smiling at us when we were young, he spent all his time earning money for this family."

Divry 6. 1987 - 2017

"I fought for many years for my family's home. The government tore it down and for five years the local government had promised to give us a new apartment, but they never did. So I persistently called the Nanjing central government and fought on their behalf for five years until the local government gave us a new apartment just three years ago.

"The most significant changes in China during my lifetime have been people's wealth and thoughts.

"From no electricity to computers and smartphones, from mud houses to apartment blocks; I have seen all of these big changes and more through my lifetime.

"From believing in ghosts to knowing the outside world, I see my own mind is changing. Sometimes I want to fight it,

sometimes I don't.

"During the rice harvest time, all of us children would pile up the haystacks to make our own house. I loved it; it was like my own little castle. I would stay inside. I felt very safe; I had no worries. That was my happiest time.

"My greatest fear is the passing away of my parents. I'm very scared of the time when my parents leave. I think they deserve the best that life can give them before they pass.

"One day I would like to be an interpreter.

"If all of the family can stay together without worrying about anything such as money or illness, this is what happiness means to me."



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As time travellers arrive in Nanjing, they might expect to find a Metro service ready to whisk them off to the suburbs, or possibly to destinations beyond the stars. Pods float above an elegant bridge over Xuanwu Lake waiting to be collected like futuristic "Boris Bikes". Voice activated, they will get you to your Pukou home in a thrice, before automatically and unmanned returning to the nearest PodStop.

It is a shock to the system, for sure; not at all what they envisioned. No, to see how the future was really imagined in the past, any self respecting time travellers coming to Nanjing make their first pilgrimage present day Nanjing North Railway Station.

Located on Jinpu Lu in Pukou District, the station, known as the only hundred-year-old example in China that retains its historical features complete, is rated a major historical and cultural site protected at national level. As the terminal of the Pukou-Tianjin Railway, which was the main north-south artery

for many more years, this was also the place that, amid much ceremony, welcomed Sun Yat-sen's coffin on 28th May, 1929.

Until the opening of the Yangtze River Bridge in 1968, Nanjing North was a busy place, with many passengers alighting to cross the river by ferry before boarding another train to continue their journey from Nanjing West Station in the former Xiaguan District.





A plan announced in May 2015, decreed that restoration work would begin on the station and its surroundings. As of January, 2017, it would appear that a more accurate word for the "restoration" might be "abandoned".

Yet, there is plenty evidence of care; it and the adjacent Pukou Ferry are by far the cleanest buildings around, in addition to probably being the oldest. However, it is when peeking through the windows into the waiting room of old that the time travel really starts happening.


In a way sufficiently haphazard that one wonders whether it was diliberate, numerous paintings in varying states of deterioration dot the waiting room's floor, arranged, it would appear, to display one of the world's oddest art galleries to whoever peers in the broken windows from outside.

The paintings reference imaginary people and places; they existed only in the artist's imagination as they tried to picture a future world. It is obvious that these works were a product of pre-

Cultural Revolution China; the Republician spirit is there but the influence of the then burgeoning Communist Party is also evident, simmering below the surface. This would emerge again 50 years later in the Party's propaganda posters; different doctrine, but the same artistic sensibilities in paintings that serve up a vision implying a future China will not look disimilar to that which was to be written almost twenty years later in Aldous Huxley's "Brave New World".

Should style and degree of decay be anything to go by, there can be little doubt that these works date from the time the station was built. Perhaps they once adorned the platforms, looking down on lovers saying goodbye or men going off to war. Either way, it is almost certain that the works were commissioned to give the station a more modern, international feel.

If this is how preservation is served up for China's historic railways, we'll have three more portions, please. For Nanjing North Railway station could well be China's most potent example of how the future looked a hundred years ago.



Set in the Forbidden City during a time where the only certainty is change, this story tells of the one thing uniting the past and present for one of the most important characters in Chinese history as he concludes his journey in finding freedom.

One of the most vivid memories I have from my childhood is grandma smiling, revealing kind lines etched in her face as she remarked that the Forbidden City was at its full glory in the autumn, and no colour suited the palace walls better than the fiery red hue of the autumn leaves.

I tucked my hands in my pockets as the now-yellow leaves pirouetted down the tree bark in the chilly Beijing breeze. Glancing down at my worn-out gardening shoes, I felt relieved as it dawned on me I looked no different to a regular citizen.

The small golden key in my pocket seemed to weigh heavier as I fidget restlessly with it. I have finally mustered up the courage to seek answers to this key that I've kept since I left the Forbidden City three decades ago and had forgotten its use in the voyage of time. The only clue to the key's origin are the characters "Wu Ge" engraved intricately in the lusterless gold.

I gripped the entrance ticket to this museum that I once called home tightly in my hands, as if it might disintegrate into dust. The imposing walls of the palace greeted me with a familiar hostility that made me shiver in my jacket.

The years spent in prison have weakened my tolerance of the cold weather.

Gritting my teeth with whatever was left of my strength, I took a tentative step over the threshold to the Dragon Throne Room. As I gaped around the room with the awe of a stranger and the caution of an old acquaintance, a peculiar-looking object on the table next to the Dragon Throne caught my eye. I picked the object up in my hands and examined it. It was an exquisite bamboo replica of the Forbidden City structure transformed into a cricket cage. Even the pale paint on the cage betrayed what would have once been a vibrant coat of daffodil yellow. Yellow reserved for the Emperor.

I peered between the bamboo sticks forming pillars of the cage and recoiled at what I saw inside. In the cage lay the brown, rotting body of a cricket; its wings punctured with holes. The memory burst in my mind like an old wound festering.

~ December, 1908 ~

"Please, please, he's just a baby! He doesn't belong in the palace!" An elderly woman's clenched fists hang defiantly at her sides as her high-pitched wails reverberated around the room.

"Please don't take him away from me!" Her lips trembled. The almost undetectable tremor of defeat in my grandmother's voice shattered my heart into fragments.

"I'm sorry, Lady Lingiya, but Empress Cixi has given me instructions on her deathbed to bring Pu Yi to the Forbidden City immediately. I'm afraid she does not have long left. She has chosen your grandson to

ascend to the throne as the new Emperor of the Qing Dynasty."

The general parroted as he seized control of me, and a guard held back my grand-mother. I was howling with a sadness as deep as the ocean and kicking like only a four-year-old knew how to.

"Wait!" My grandmother shouted as she broke out of the guard's hold. She grabbed a bamboo cricket cage from the kitchen along with a glistening golden key and thrust them into the general's hands.

The loud protesting chirps from the cricket rang in my ears like rich music.

"Make sure my grandson is in possession of this cricket cage and key when he arrives at the palace." My grandmother ordered as she fixed a fierce glare on the general. Her face then melted into a fond expression as she clutched my tiny hands in hers.

"Take care of the cricket, Wu Ge. Be its friend. Listen to the songs it sings. Don't ever lose this golden key, my boy. Set the cricket free, and you will be free too." She kissed my tear-stained cheek one last time and watched, suppressing her sobs, as men with braids took me away forever.

My eyes opened. The cage was still in my hands. My nickname was still carved into the golden key, now a staggering weight in my pocket. The cricket of my childhood that once upon a time sung songs of burning desire fading into subdued yearning for a life that wasn't confined within the wires of the cage still remained silent.

I swallowed, took the key from my pocket and opened the cage with shaking fingers. My heart squeezed painfully at the decayed sight of my beloved cricket, a gift I wasted from my grandmother. I looked away with shame.

A boy with wide, curious eyes gazed at the Dragon Throne with a terrified wonder, and something in his expression reminded me of the way I used to stare at the throne;

like it was a magical burden. Impulse drove me as I turned to the boy and carefully handed the cricket resting peacefully in my palm and my golden key to him. His eyes lit up in a childish delight.

"This is a very special cricket. Bury it somewhere beautiful with the key." I said to the boy.

"Is it special because you found it on the Dragon Throne?" He asked.

"No. The last Qing Emperor kept this cricket as his pet. He loved it very much."

We sat down on the palace grounds and I told him the story of the boy and the cricket. A tiny, powerful feeling blossomed in my chest. Hope. Hope that one day I would no longer hear the cricket sing songs of melancholy, but songs of freedom in heaven.

I worked tirelessly in my garden, tending to the flowers that bloomed in a mélange of forms and sizes ranging from elfin to brandishing giants. They were my desperate attempt at repainting the grey canvas of my life with a little colour.

The cricket cage was already embedded in layers of soil, occupying its place as the abandoned past. New flowers would soon spring up on the spot. Suddenly, a sound intruded my tranquil afternoon thoughts like a profanity. I pause to listen, like I used to do as a child. I dropped down to my knees and sprawled on the grassy earth, closing my eyes.

I hope somewhere, my grandmother is listening too.

Time became irrelevant as I drowned myself in the enchanting sound of the cricket crooning a song of freedom. Its voice drifted down from the sky in a cascade of light. In this moment, I was not The Last Emperor, whose story was immortalized in history textbooks. I was just Pu Yi, a boy whose story was immortalised in the songs sung by crickets. I was finally free.

Chinese Cities Take the biscuit

It's that time of year again. Don your red undies, stash up on crisp 100 notes and line up bottles of water by the bedside. It's Chinese New Year.

Left hand baijiu, right hand guazi, chicken wing in mouth and dangling from the lips, a cigarette. Chinese New Year, Spring Festival, whatever you like to call it, is better envisaged in my head as China's annual seven-day consuming bonanza.

Food must top the list as one of Chinese people's favourite things, be it the act of eating, frying, stuffing, steaming or simply rambling endlessly on about it. It is not surprising therefore that food too has permeated China's creative world and become a recurring theme for Chinese artists today.

In October I talked about river crabs, the centrepiece of lavish government banquets, twisted by Ai Weiwei to reveal dark undertones of party corruption and hypocrisy. This month, I bring you something sweeter. Prominent contemporary artist Song Dong stashed up on sugary snacks in time for New Year, balancing and stacking them to recreate Shanghai in sweet miniature.

From the Bund to the bridges, this is not the artist's first munchable metropolis. Previously there was Beijing, then London, Paris and Lille. Each one fashioned from a selection of patisseries and cookies, crackers, biscuits and cake, eventually came to be dismantled and digested by the visitors who wowed and drooled over them. Wafer walls have truly never sounded so good.

The artworks create a strong sense of temptation. We want to tuck in and feast, but we risk the consequences of over indulging. More than just sculptures, his confectionary cities are also performances and Shanghai is no exception. At the opening of his exhibition in the Rockbund Art Museum, guests were invited to nibble their way through highways and skyscrapers, stadiums and parks. And the leftovers? Those are for people like us to scrape

up while watching the installation on a screen. So hurry if you want to know what art really tastes like.


Beyond their instant visual appeal, Song Dong's edible cities explore the vast expansion of metropolises in Asia, as well as globally, and the ever increasing monotony of the urban world. Built from the same materials, cities around the world today are starting to mimic one another and to loose their own identity, a phenomenon so evident in China. Travelling, says the artist, will become a thing of the past.

While Song Dong builds with biscuits, Yang Yongliang uses the fabric of cities themselves to construct his works. His intensely engaging composite photographs layer thousands of images of high-rise to create a texture resembling mountains from Song dynasty landscape paintings. For forests he uses pylons and cranes, while roads and highways take the place of streams. From afar is a fairytale land of nature, tranquillity and calm, but up close reveals a ceaseless and chaotic manmade jungle. There are no travellers in these worlds, only mindless city folk.

The artist directly references Song dynasty landscape paintings but uses modern imagery and techniques such as photography and animation therefore operating in a tense position between tradition and modernity, nature and man. They are beautiful and terrifying at once. I urge you to Google.

With an urban population of just over 55 percent of China today, the trend of migrating from country to city is set to continue. But this is the one time of year when that rule is reversed as people scramble onto trains and buses to return to their hometowns, worlds away from the mighty metropolises where they dwell for the rest of the year. China's annual consuming bonanza takes place not in Shanghai nor in the Rockbund Art Museum, but rather in rural China where morsel upon morsel is squashed between chopsticks and the floor transformed into a carpet of guazi shells.

Paradise



"You have 30 days", the immigration officer said to me as I entered Manila. Having departed Shanghai earlier that morning, we had arranged a weeklong stay in the Philippines just shy of Spring Festival, in order to relax and avoid the mad rush. Manila, however, was not our final destination (and for good reason); instead, we chose one of the Philippines' 7,000 pristine islands on which to enjoy our stay.

A domestic flight, bus, boat, and tricycle ride later, we finally arrived on the beach and, man, was it worth it, the place is stunning. The mid-afternoon air cooled our sweaty necks as we sunk our pale feet into the sand and wiggling our toes about. Strolling down the white beach, we were struck by the natural beauty of the place. We walked and watched as the blue water lay still, glistening in the sunlight, beachgoers frolicking about with their selfie sticks and locals competing with one another to get tourists onto their catamarans.



Restaurants and bars lined the beachfront as far as the island stretched north so tourists were in no way short of food, drink, entertainment, "massageee" and/ or shopping, for the lack of space this tiny island certainly had it all.

As the days moulded into one, we certainly adapted to island life pretty well. Coconuts and cold beers sat by our beach beds, the smell of sunscreen provided a familiar sense of calm, with all the while soft Carib-

bean music playing in the background rocking us in and out of fabulous sunset slumbers.

Nights were spent wandering the beachfront while eyeing up the best seafood restaurant in which to settle. Freshly caught that day, most restaurants will lay it all out for you on a bed of ice; after being selected and weighed the restaurant will cook it for you whichever way you like (I usually went with garlic and butter on a bed of rice!) After eating like kingson a daily basis, post dinner drinks were too good to pass up; every night the beach lit up with fairy lights, candles and fire twirlers.

Aside from the odd hawker or puppy faced child that would approach our table from time to time, the poverty and devastation of the Philippines are kept far away from the tourists, for obvious reasons. However, if you are anyone who reads a newspaper or has been listening to the news recently, the situation in the Philippines is certainly of great concern to us all.

Consider him if you will, the Tump of the East;

President Rodrigo Duterte has been in office for only seven months and is responsible for the deaths of over 6,000 people in that time.

To blame? His highly controversial approach to the "war on drugs", by which he has urged all citizens to shoot and kill those suspected of dealing drugs, being addicts or involved in crime in any way. Time Magazine reported, "the victims [are] suspected users and pushers, [they] do not enjoy the due process, and are always killed at night, sometimes inside their own homes. The perpetrators are vigilantes, hired guns and likely cops too".

Interestingly, Filipino citizens are praising his actions and defending them, protesting an absolute dire need for it. "Filipino's take a utilitarian approach to the war on drugs; killing is bad, but a society tainted by drugs and crime is worse... About 77 percent of Filipino's are satisfied with Duterte's performance, according to a poll conducted in December," Nash Jenkins, Time Magazine.

Filipino's can trace their earliest origins right back to the Neolithic civilizations of the Yangtze River, when they

began migrating to the Philippines around 4.000 years ago (Scott, William, Prehispanic Source Material). Over time, the Chinese, Indians, and Burmese began adding to Filipino heritage and culture. Islam then started to spread and Manila was Islamised during the reign of Sultan Bolkiahin from 1485 to 1521. (Pusat Seiarah Brunei. 2009). The Muslims then proceeded to wage wars and conduct slave-raids. (Celestino C. Macachor (2011), "Searching for Kali in the Indigenous Chronicles of Jovito Abellana").

The islands were sparsely populated due to constant natural disasters and inter-kingdom conflicts. Therefore, colonisation was made easy and the small states of the archipelago quickly became incorporated into the Spanish Empire, becoming Hispanicised and Christianised (Agoncillo, Teodoro A, History of the Filipino People). Foodstuffs such as maize, tomatoes, potatoes, chili peppers, chocolate and pineapples from Mexico and Peru were introduced to the Philippines as a result of direct trade between Manila and Acapulco via the largest wooden ships ever built: the Manila Galleons.

Eventually, the United States became a strong ally of the Philippines, providing over the years, troops, aid and popular American influence through food and entertainment. However, President Duterte seems set on destroying such ties, having expressed strong anti-Western sentiments and by buddying up with Beijing instead. Recently, China and the Philippines signed an agreement that brings infrastructure to the Philippines as well as a promise from Duterte to buy weapons from the Chinese, highlighting what he calls, "a separation from the United States".

Random kidnappings for ransom of ethnic Chinese has sporadically been happing for some time now, as they are considered wealthier than the average Filipino.

As more and more Chinese with new money flood into the Philippines as holidaymakers, are they now at a higher risk for kidnappings? With President Duterte's shoot-to-kill policy predictably getting out of hand, it remains hard to tell.

With "Good morning Sir, Good morning Madam", and a smile greeting us everywhere we went on the island, we felt a world away from what was really happening in the Philippines; "The tourism industry, which employs I in 10 Filipino's and provides 7.8 percent of GDP, is reeling" (Nash Jenkins, Time). While Duterte's war on drugs does not at present pose a threat to tourists, "terrorism [from Islamic groups to the south] may pose the greatest threat to tourists' safety. While most parts of the archipelago are relatively safe to visit, certain areas where terrorist cells have been at large are best avoided", was the advice given by travel insurance company World Nomads recently.



Upon our departure, boat loads of Chinese and Korean tourists were making their way on to the many islands. Most shuttled along by tour groups, some individual families, couples and the odd lone traveler arrived on the jetties, suitcases in hand, sun hats on head. Seemingly like every other tourist traveling to the Philippines, they were either unaware of the happenings around them or unfazed by it. Either way, let us hope that what is happening around them sorts itself out soon and does not filter into the area. Such a thing would be catastrophic to the islands themselves, the economy and the beautiful Filipino people working so hard, always with a smile on their face, to make it beautiful for themselves and us.



PRUNING PRECEDES THRIVING

Pruning has been well understood by fruit farmers and horticulturists for generations. You want healthier fruit trees, more vibrant roses? You must engage in strategic pruning.

Before you begin take thoughtful time to do some assessment. Here are a few questions to get you started:

- How do you spend your time? Your money?
- Do you spend more time with top performers or problem employees?
- Do you know your customers well? Are there some more profitable than others?
- Do you have habits or standard work that prevent or rob growth?

Do your homework. Take time to analyse what is most important to you or your business; determine what needs to be trimmed, reduced or eliminated.

Choose the Right Season and Appropriate Tools

Any farmer will tell you there is a proper season and tool for each activity. So is the case with pruning. Often pruning is done during the "dormant" season; late Autumn to late Winter, never during a growth season.

As you begin to assess areas that need to be trimmed or eliminated, ask is this the right time? For example, if you know there are certain customers you want to discontinue serving, is there a low season or contract period that makes better sense than other times?

Pruning the "Healthy"

This can be the most difficult task of pruning, trimming or reducing areas that appear to be quite healthy.

For example, you may have had strong sales results last year. Revenues increased, yet profits did not. After analysis, you realise the cost to serve and retain certain customers is eating into the profits from other more suitable customers. What do you do? Strategically prune.

The same could be said for how you invest your time with relationships or activities. Are you involved with too many "good" activities or people? Review your calendar, and begin trimming back with intentionality. Stick to the people and engagements that most align with your core objectives. Maximize the fruit in your life.

Pruning the "Diseased"

Often we fail to recognise the need to eliminate portions of our business or lives that are simply not healthy. We often have good reason; "We've always done it that way", "That is part of our corporate culture". Holding on to tradition or processes that are no longer appropriate can suck the life from an otherwise vibrant business.

This principle is also true with relationships or team members. I often am amazed at how people endure unnecessarily unhealthy relationships or work performances simply for fear of confrontation or disruption.

Pruning the "Dead"

Yes, this one should be more obvious. If a branch or bud is dead, it has got to go. Yet how often do we continue a program, maintain customers or relationships that have long since been dead, or almost dead?

Pruning the dead often takes courage. Typically we want to give benefit of the doubt, and opportunity for a turnaround. However, once the pruning decision is made, often life pours into the remaining branches.

Therefore, as the latter part of the winter is upon us, perhaps this is your time to prune.

Stir It Up by Ella Fisher

YANGZHOU'S STAPLE

Whenever I think of Italy, I think of pasta; England, I think of potatoes and China, guess what, rice! I can't believe I haven't thought about doing a rice dish until now; it seemed so simple and yet so obvious. No matter what restaurant you go into, you always find a bountiful amount of rice dishes.

Whilst I do enjoy a bowl of steamed rice, this month I want to make the staple we all know and love; Yangzhou Fried Rice, a dish you can find on any street corner being cooked outside on a simple gas stove. It tastes incredible and so satisfyingly savoury! This time I thought I would try and recreate this staple dish on my own humble stove and this is the best tasting version I could make:

- 2 cups of glutinous rice
- 2 cups of cold water
- 2 tbsp groundnut oil
- 2 large eggs (beaten)
- 150-200g prawns/shrimp (if bought frozen, make sure to defrost them thoroughly before cooking)
- 150-200g of Chinese sausage (sliced)
- 1 onion (finely sliced)
- 1 carrot finely sliced
- ½ pak choi (finely sliced)
- ½ Chinese cabbage (finely sliced)
- 2 spring onions (finely chopped)
- 1½ tsp light soy sauce
- ¼ teaspoon sugar
- 1 tsp shaoxing rice wine
- ½ tsp ground white pepper

With all these ingredients very easy to find in any supermarket or fruit and veg market, the main thing you need to focus on is cooking the rice. I have a rice cooker, but if you don't you can still use a heavy duty saucepan. My method is fool proof. For every cup of rice, use an equal amount of water. It is important you thoroughly wash and rinse the rice before you cook it. If you have a rice cooker, put 2 cups of water and

rice in the cooker, turn it on and leave until your cooker says it's cooked (mine shows an orange light when it's done and keeps it warm). If you are using a saucepan, put the rice and water in the pan, keep it on a simmer until the water has evaporated. Before you move on to the frying part, it is important that the rice is COLD. So leave The rest is extremely simple!

First, break the clumps of rice up and tip onto a clean chopping board. Set aside. Add 1 tbsp of oil to the wok on a medium heat. Once hot, add the beaten egg and scramble until they are pale, firm and in clumps. Remove from the wok. Wipe the wok down with some kitchen paper, then add the remaining oil and turn the heat up to high. Add the onion and carrots and cook for 1 minute. Next, add the Chinese sausage and prawns and cook for 1-2 minutes, add the pak choi and cabbage and cook for a further minute. Then add the rice and egg, fry together for 1-2 minutes, ensuring you are constantly tossing the rice and making sure all the ingredients are evenly distributed. This is also agood time to break up any extra clumps you have found in the rice. Finally, add the spring onions, soy sauce, white pepper, sugar and rice wine and keep stirring for around 1 minute or until the seasoning is incorporated into the rice. Taste and add anymore seasoning if you wish, then tip into a bowl and serve.

This dish requires full concentration when cooking and good preparation. Cut all the veggies to the same thickness otherwise they will all take different lengths of time to cook. However, once mastered, this quick and simple dish provides amazing flavour and can be customised; the possible flavour combinations are endless. I invite you to create your own take on this classic Chinese staple; what will you come up with?





The passing of journalist AA Gill last December had little impact here in China. At the time, when I commented on my shock to a few friends, somehow the very London-ness of his themes made his charm and importance hard to explain. Since then, I have heard American friends mention his name. So I hope this opinionated, dyslexic master of style is receiving some international appreciation.

His killer was cancer. Gill himself (at least in print) appeared to be stoical about his predicament after a sudden diagnosis. That he had been an alcoholic until his early 30s, and continued smoking enthusiastically long after that, gave the 62-year-old a different perspective on the subject.

We expect tobacco and alcohol to take some toll; it is not integral to their appeal, but it is part of the psychological deal we undertake while consuming them in the 21st century.

Tea, meanwhile, has somehow been branded as their antithesis. Contrasted in ancient Chinese poetry, tea and booze were paired by the 19th Century temperance movement. Today, tea is the boring antioxidant counterpart to "stronger" drinks or stimulants such as nicotine.

Now, I am not teetotal myself. But I am, to some extent, tea addicted. Drinking tea is something I look forward to. I lean hard on it when flustered. There is muscle-memory and all kinds of associations attached to the ritual. And the fact is that I do drink a lot of the stuff.

The greatest reminder of this is in the staining of my teeth. Last week, I again paid a dentist for a "scale and polish". It's a simple procedure but not yet a standard one in China. The cost of the equivalent to \$6-800 includes the mandatory blood test (!).

My teeth do get pretty dark, especially those at the front. To be accurate, they are the real "strainer" on which this column is named, as the only barrier against loose leaves sipped from a glass. When I suggest to dentists that I try drinking less tea in future, they stress that the damage is "cosmetic"; if anything, they say, the anti-bacterial compounds and fluoride present a net gain for overall dental health.

Well, that's nice to hear. And I'll admit that knowing this does make me more complacent about my tannin consumption. If I could pay a doctor a small fee each year to "clean up" my lungs similarly, would I smoke cigars regularly? I'm afraid to say I might. Coward.

Yet, I am well aware that the medical consensus could swiftly move away from tea, or at least against the manufactured product I have drunk throughout my adult life. As adults, we choose the cities in which we live, and breathe their air accordingly. Naturally, there is risk in that.

Should it transpire that the choices I have made, and fallen into, are not choices compatible with living the longest of lives, I hope that, like AA Gill, I can at least be proud of having drunk green tea and eaten red meat, beautifully.

The Flight to Glo Now Boarding

■ There is a nice little piece of urban legend, an apocrophyl story if you will, surrounding the opening of the "British" restuarant Glo in Xinjiekou's latest icon, the House of Fraser Store. It is supposed that CEO of the China end of the chain store insisted on journeying to Shanghai to have lunch in the contendee's eatery there, before proclaiming it to be fit, which presumably means "British enough", to open its doors within House of Fraser in Nanjing.

But does The Nanjinger agree?

For starters, the fish and chips comes with mushy peas. Many of our non-British readers shall likely be unfamiliar with this great UK tradition, in which peas are soaked overnight in water and baking soda, before being simmered until they form a thick green lumpy

mash that is also colloquially known as, a little cruelly, as "Yorkshire caviar". Trust us, it tastes a lot better than it sounds, and at Glo they are done to perfection, with the caveat being there are countless recipes for mushy peas and many local varieties, so expect healthy debate.

Still with the fish and chips, the former are sourced from the waters of the North Sea around Iceland. Close enough.

Then there is the bacon that is uncannily British. And just how do they manage that? Well, by making them in Ningbo, of course, along with the sausages.

But seriously, having a centralised kitchen for such items has helped the brand maintain standards across its eight branches, along with its identity as a whole, not a bad idea in a world where a dodgy (and outrageously priced) sausage is never more than a Metro ride away (pardon the pun).

Mesmorisingly great value for money is also offered on the weekday lunch menu; two courses for ¥68,

three for just ¥88; choose from the likes of seafood or carbonara pasta, bacon cheese burger, fish and chips or a full English breakfast.

For the beer drinkers, that great British bitter London Pride can be found on the menu, standing (almost) head and shoulders beside Nanjing pride, as represented by the mighty Master Gao's ales that are currently all the rage.

As a drawback, Glo takes dining in a mall to a new level, whereby one can actually read the price tags on the clothes on sale next door over the top of one's reading glasses while perusing the menu.

Yet, this is actually not as annoying as it sounds and may well actually be a core strength. The fact that Glo is located in the mall itself, as opposed to in a unit within, means it is akin to eating in a very fancy airport, except without the announcements and scents drifting in from duty free.

The Well-Known Secret (of Zaika)

■ The first time I heard of Zaika, my friend acted like he was letting me in on a secret. He mentioned in hushed tones how it was hidden down an alley and how it would periodically have an (ever rare in Nanjing) Indian buffet. It sounded wonderful, and I made up my mind to go with him and explore this secret locale.

When we arrived, I found that it was not quite the quiet little cafe I had imagined. The place was packed with people eager to enjoy the Indian buffet! Bollywood music videos playing loudly on a giant television only added to the lively atmosphere. It seems this secret eatery was, surprisingly, quite well-known!

This is just a snapshot of the experience that is Zaika, and experience is definitely the word for it! While other Indian restaurants exist in Nanjing, Zaika fills a new small niche by making you, the patron, a part of its community. Even on nights where there is no buffet, customers are

treated like friends, even on a first visit, and the Indian owners are always willing to strike up a conversation.

There is also a WeChat group dedicated to the periodic buffets and other events the restaurant hosts; though other restaurants use groups as well with mixed results, know that this one is definitely worth your time.

Granted, there is not much reason to go if the food fails to deliver. Fortunately, this is not the case whatsoever. The regular menu boasts classics; butter chicken, a plethora of vegetable options, biryani, and everything in between, all at prices a bit cheaper than the competition. Be cautious! While all dining options are delicious, expect a kick to many dishes, with sauces and curries in particular, that adds some extra heat.



Though the atmosphere is a little quieter on non-buffet nights, this is not a total drawback, as the familial, community feeling is still present. Perhaps, on some quiet night exploring a Chinese alleyway, you too may find yourself not only eating delicious Indian food, but having a wonderful, new, and "secret" experience!

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
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Statute of Limitations on Civil Proceedings in China

■ Try to imagine yourself in this situation: once upon a time you lent some money to your friend for a period of two months, but that friend failed to repay you after expiry of the two months. You said or claimed nothing from them at the time, but now, many years later you ask them to repay but they refuse. When you bring an action against them with the people's court, their defense is that the time limit for the action has passed. You lose the case. You appeal to the Intermediate People's Court, and you lose the case again in the second instance. You have lost your money and your friendship, and only because you failed to exercise your rights diligently.

Yes, you may feel wronged, but, according to the Law, this is a fair judgment. Most ordinary people do not know of such a concept in law, the Statute of Limitations, or time limit for action, that exists in both common and civil law systems.

A Statute of Limitations is a statute setting out time limits for legal action in certain cases. If the period of time specified in a Statute of Limitations (hereinafter also referred to as the time limit for action) passes, and a claim is filed, the claim is liable to be rejected by the People's Court.

The Purpose of Statute of Limitations

The reasons for specifying a time limit for exercise of rights are, (i) to protect the defendants, so that they will not be adversely affected by difficulty or failure to produce evidence due to passage of an unreasonable long period of time; (ii) to maintain the existing order and maintain the equity of law; and (iii) to simplify the legal relationship, relive the workload of the courts and reduce transaction costs.

The Specific Statutes of Limitations

The ordinary time limit for action, in accordance with Article 135 of the General Rules of the Civil Law, shall be two years except in the following cases (Article 136 of the General Rules of the Civil Law) whereby the time limit is only one year:

- Claims for compensation for bodily injuries;
- (ii) Sales of substandard goods without proper notice to that effect:
- (iii) Delays in paying rent or refusal to pay rent;
- (iv) Loss of or damage to property left in the care of another person.

The longest time limit for action is described in Article 137 of the General Rules of the Civil Law as follows: "A time limit for action shall begin when the obligee knows or should know that his rights have been infringed upon". However, the people's court shall not protect his rights if 20 years have passed since the infringement. Under special circumstances, the People's Court may extend the time limit for action.

Suspension and Interruption of the Time Limit for Action

A time limit for action shall be suspended during the last six months of the limitation if the plaintiff cannot exercise their right of claim because of force majeure or other obstacles. The time limit for action shall resume on the day when the grounds for the suspension are eliminated. A time limit for action shall be interrupted if suit is brought or if one party makes a claim for or agrees to a fulfillment of obligations. The new time limit shall be counted from the time of the interruption.

Everyone should bear in mind the concept of Statute of Limitations, and exercise their rights diligently in order to avoid the risk of expiry of the time limit for action. Remember the saying "The laws aid the vigilant, not the negligent."

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
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
